Very Little Debt

The city has no debt except \$150,000 recently borrowed the new school. The money for ing town, I would like to suggest the building was loaned locally and the interest rate is only six per cent. Street work, whether on the local improvement plan or from general revenue, is paid cash down and no money is borrowed for that class of work. In order to meet the payments the mill rate is 15 on the dollar or 1 1/2 per cent levied on an assessed value based on actual selling or rental values of the properties affected, improvements paying the same as land. In making this assessment the assessor considers the landlord is entitled to a net return of 8 per cent on his money after allowing for taxes and depreciation.

There is no city engineer but the city foreman is a civil engineer and the city manager, being a builder, the need is not great. When an engineer is needed for special work, A. J. Ela, engineer for the power and light company is engaged temporarily. -

Outside the city roads are being constructed by the federal government. Already there is a road leading seven miles northward along the shore of Tongas Narrows to Ward's Cove and the surfacing of a road south to Saxman three miles distant is proceeding. These roads are well made and give the people an opportunity to get out of town. Other roads in the neighborhood are planned.
