### Making Preparations For Big Business.

When the grain elevator is built we naturally expect to do a great deal more shipping business than is being done today. The railway will handle very much more freight than it is now handling and the company doubtless is getting ready for the big event.

There have been cases where railways have been caught napping, where no preparations have been made to meet coming movements and the result has been disastrous.

In the autumn the first Japanese liner is to call here on a trial trip and it is understood that if there is business the steamers will come here regularly. We wonder if efforts are being made by the railway to collect freight for these vessels. If the C.P.R. could collect enough freight and passengers, over ninety per cent of which originated at points east of Vancouver, to keep the Empresses running regularly, even before Vancouver was anything more than a small town, it ought to be easy for the Canadian National with their immense system to collect enough to keep the Japanese liners running out of this port. It would be interesting to know if any steps are being taken with this end in view.

### Why Compete When Business is Here?

Apparently the Canadian National is making an effort to compete with the C.P.R. on its own ground, when here there is a virgin port equipped to handle the business without any opposition. Apparently the Nippon Yusen Kaisha is prepared to operate vessels here in conjunction with the railway company, to carry its silk through this port and to do a real transportation business. But nothing has been done so far. Now, however, the elevator is being built and there is a new opportunity to make this the Canadian National outlet, using Canadian National docks, paying no port dues and no switching charges to a rival concern.

The future of Prince Rupert seems to lie in a tieup with the Japanese lines. The Blue Funnel line has thrown in its lot with Vancouver. If there is real co-operation, the N.Y.K. can beat any of them out in point of time by using Prince Rupert. It might be a good thing for the Board of Trade to get into touch with the Japanese company and find out if possible under what conditions they would come here and then put it up to the railway company. What we need is a transpacific line of steamships plying to this port in order to make it really prosperous.

"As good as anything in vaudeville" is one of the comments heard most often concerning the fourteen-act vaudeville program to be given by the University of California Glee Club in the Westholme Theatre next Monday and Tuesday.
