Companionship As Time Waster.

Much conversation that is carried on is of such a nature that it does little to stimulate the intellect or the imagination. It is deadening rather than enlivening. It has a leveling down effect. On the other hand conversation may be strictly educational and uplifting. It may have a stimulating effect.

Value Of Reading Depends On Type Of Books.

The value of reading depends very largely on the type of book read. To read a clever book is to put oneself in touch with a master mind but to read some of the trash that goes out from the printing presses is deadening, enervating and deteriorating in its tendency.

While we do not necessarily have to turn to the heavy literature of former generations, we can select that which is worth while from modern writings. Books, like friends, should be carefully chosen.

Much Nearer Route To Peace River District.

The proposed route to Peace River by way of Brule Lake may be worth something to the Peace River people but it does not open up the British Columbia portion of the district and it does not give by any means the most direct service. A local resident who has made a study of the country says that by coming out at or near Hazelton, Pouce Coupe would be three hundred miles nearer here than by way of Brule Lake and the line would open up a splendid country that would develop rapidly and enable the settling of thousands of farmers.

It is to be hoped that the line will yet be built through British Columbia, even if the P.G.E. cannot be utilized to carry the grain to Vancouver.

DAN MCGREW IS HOUND OF HELL

Story of Robert Service Poem Told in Picture Here Tonight

After two years of varying success in touring South Sea Islands, the musical comedy troupe, of which Lou Lorraine is the leading dancer, and her husband, Jim Elliott, is orchestra leader, scores overnight success when the director of the company stages a "ship cabaret" in an old sea-going vessel stranded on the South Sea shores.

Lou becomes a big favorite, but the squalor of the place nauseates her and she tells Jim they must leave, at least for the sake of their two-year-old boy. Jim's quiet emotional nature is mistaken for indifference by Lou; although he loves his wife and child dearly.

Meets Dan McGrew. One night at the resort, Lou meets a slick gambler, Dan McGrew, who tells her she could make her fortune if she would do her act in New York under his management. Her husband suspects McGrew's designs and forbids Lou to go.

But Lou is made desperate through the hardships that her child has to endure and decides to take a chance on big city success in order that the boy may be brought up in decent comfort. She leaves with McGrew, who contrives to have the child left behind at the last minute.

In New York, through McGrew's shrewd management, Lou captures the town as an entertainer in a fashionable cabaret. She sends money for Jim and the boy to join her and Jim cables that they are on their way. But McGrew intercepts the cable and forges another in its place, in which he says that the child has died through Lou's neglect and that Lou and McGrew can go to hell together.

The Broadway Fire. McGrew's idea in the forgery is to make the way clear for turning Lou over to Jake Hubbel, an Alaskan millionaire, who has promised McGrew a \$50,000 bonus if Lou is persuaded to become Mrs. Hubbel.

Lou is in a frenzy of despair at the forged cable and is ready for any madness. But that night she has to appear as usual at the cabaret.

Jim, meanwhile, has arrived in New York. He breaks into the cabaret and attacks McGrew, but, as they are fighting, the cabaret catches on fire. It is a terrific blaze and Lou is overcome by smoke. Hubbel rescues her, and, dazed by the horror of her experiences, she agrees to leave with Hubbel and McGrew for Alaska.

In the Malamute Saloon. In their trip over the snows, McGrew, fearing he won't get his \$50,000, kills Hubbel and robs him. He then establishes himself in a Malamute saloon, where he becomes known as "Dangerous Dan," an invincibly cool gambler and gunman. Lou drifts into liquor-drinking, peroxide despondency.

Jim, meanwhile, recovering from the burns he suffered in the fire, is visited at the hospital in New York by a girl named Flo Dupont, who has been killed by McGrew. Flo tells Jim of the forged cablegram that drove Lou to desperation and Jim swears vengeance.
