

Baseball Series Tied; Doubleheader Sunday May Decide Season Champions

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Home Building Moves Upward CMHC Reports

OTTAWA (CP)—House construction, on the downgrade for months, has again swung upward.

Officials of the crown-owned Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation said Wednesday a reversal of the trend came in May. Preliminary reports indicate the increase continued at least through June and July.

The slump in home construction started midway through 1951 and continued to April last.

In May, said the corporation report, the number of new housing units started in cities totalled 7900 compared with 7500 in the same month of 1951. Figures for later months were not available.
