LAST SHRINE PARTY HERE

Members of Zuhrah Temple Arrived by Steamer From South This Morning - Took Special Train East

The arrival of the C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. D. Donald, from Vancouver this morning with 340 members of Zuhrah Shrine, Minneapolis, marked the second special sailing of the coast steamers to handle these parties of Shriners returning to their homes in the East by way of the "Inland Passage" and Prince Rupert.

The Prince Rupert sailed at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and is due back from there at six o'clock tomorrow morning.

The Prince George, which sailed at 8 o'clock last night for the south after returning from Stewart with the Syrian Shrine party, will be back from the south on Sunday morning at 6 o'clock and will sail for Stewart that day at 12 noon.

Regular business will be handled on all these rearranged sailings.

Accompanying Zuhrah Shrine party this morning was R. F. McNaughton, C.N.R. district passenger agent, who went East with them as far as Jasper on their special train.

The Zuhrah Shrine party did not spend long in the city this morning. The steamer arrived with them at 8.15 and at 10 o'clock the special train of thirteen cars which carried them east pulled out.
