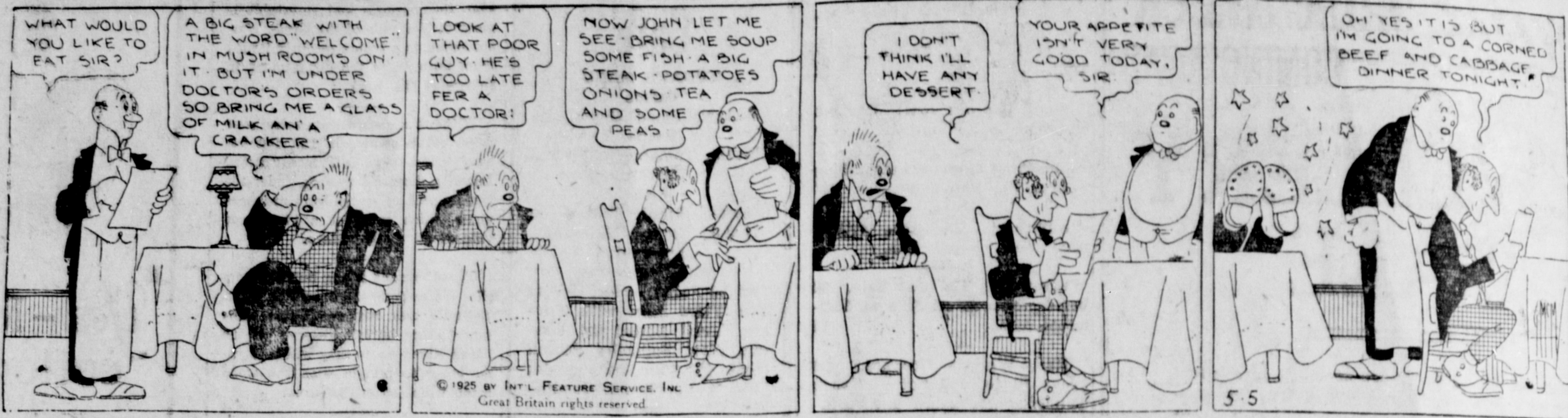

LONDON GOSSIP

Queen Receives Presents; King Entertains; Lord Leverhulme's House; London Season

LONDON, Eng., June 24.—(By Canadian Press).—Queen Mary on her birthday received a shower of birthday presents and greetings.

What presents the Queen gets for her birthday is a problem that has always intrigued the inquisitive, and this year, for some reason, the veil has been slightly lifted from the array of packages and parcels that (metaphorically, may be) awaits Queen Mary on her birthday breakfast table.

Well, David sent his presents a few days too soon, but they were none the less welcome for the reason that they were some magnificent ostrich feathers wonderfully colored and shaded, all the way from South Africa. King George gave his consort a wonderful emerald ring set in platinum—a setting that appeals to the Queen immensely for the majority of her private jewels, and all the State jewels, are set in gold. Princess Mary gave her mother some old lace, and the gifts of Prince George, the baby (and, it is whispered, the favorite of the Queen), included some of the latest gramophone records.

Used the Gold Plate

On Derby night King George entertained his friends of the Jockey Club to dinner at Buckingham Palace and the gold plate service was used. Queen Mary went out to a private party on her own. Derby night is the one night of the year when the King entertains as a bachelor.

Leverhulme's House

It is generally anticipated in London that Grosvenor House, which the late Lord Leverhulme bought from the Duke of Westminster only a few months ago, will now be repurchased by an American. It is the most palatial of the West End mansions and has a superb view of Hyde Park.

Unfortunately, the executors of the late soap king are not willing to let the mansion for short periods at enormous rentals, but had this been the case there would have been a rush of American hostesses for it. However, anybody can buy a 98 years' lease for about eight million dollars.

Of all the many events in its long social history none was so remarkable as the \$5,000 a head dinner which was given during the Tariff Reform Campaign. Everybody who has subscribed that amount towards the campaign was, as a reward, invited to dine with the Duke of Westminster.

The Duke is now living in his small but luxurious bachelor apartment at a local hotel.

London is preparing for a rush of overseas visitors in August and September. London's summer weather in the earlier months of the season has been so uncertain for the last few years that London hotel managers now state that this has resulted in heavier reservations this year for August and September than ever before. In view of this the social calendar has been revised and many of the season's events have been put back.

DOCK BUILT BY PROVINCE

Local Swimming Club Relieved of Expense of Providing Landing at Salt Lakes

The new dock and approach at Salt Lakes Park has just been completed by the provincial government. It is a more permanent structure than has been there before and is open to everyone to use. This is the first time there has been a public dock at the present location, for several years past the landing having been built and maintained by A. Swanson for his ferry service.

The present float is 100 feet long by about 25 feet wide and is well supported by good float logs.

The floats at the lake for the use of swimmers and the dressing rooms are kept up by the swimming club.
