Opposition To Prince Rupert.

Apparently Sir Henry Drayton considers Prince Rupert of little value from a voting point of view. He seems to assume that it will go Liberal anyway at the next election and as a matter of policy it is not worth while to do or say anything in favor of this port. He opposed the vote for the local elevator when it came up several days ago and he opposed it and criticized the expenditure severely yesterday.

Sir Henry gets righteously indignant at any money being spent on a Canadian National port. He is the active leader of the Conservative remnant in the House of Commons, attending to most of the intensive criticism for his party. Happily for us some of the Progressives support the government, especially on such matters as this and as a result the elevator vote is passed and the completion of the structure assured. Fred Stork of course did his bit in getting it through.

Still Rumors Of Silk Trade Here.

There are still rumors that Prince Rupert will handle the silk trade from the Orient by way of the Nippon-Yusen Kaisha steamer. New speedy vessels have been built for that big company and they can beat any other time by shipping this way, if the Canadian National Railway co-operates by speeding up its service. The Japanese have had their eyes on this route for a long time and one of these days it will be adopted. The coming of the Yokohama Maru here this autumn is likely to be the precursor of regular sailings if it is found that the business can be done this way.

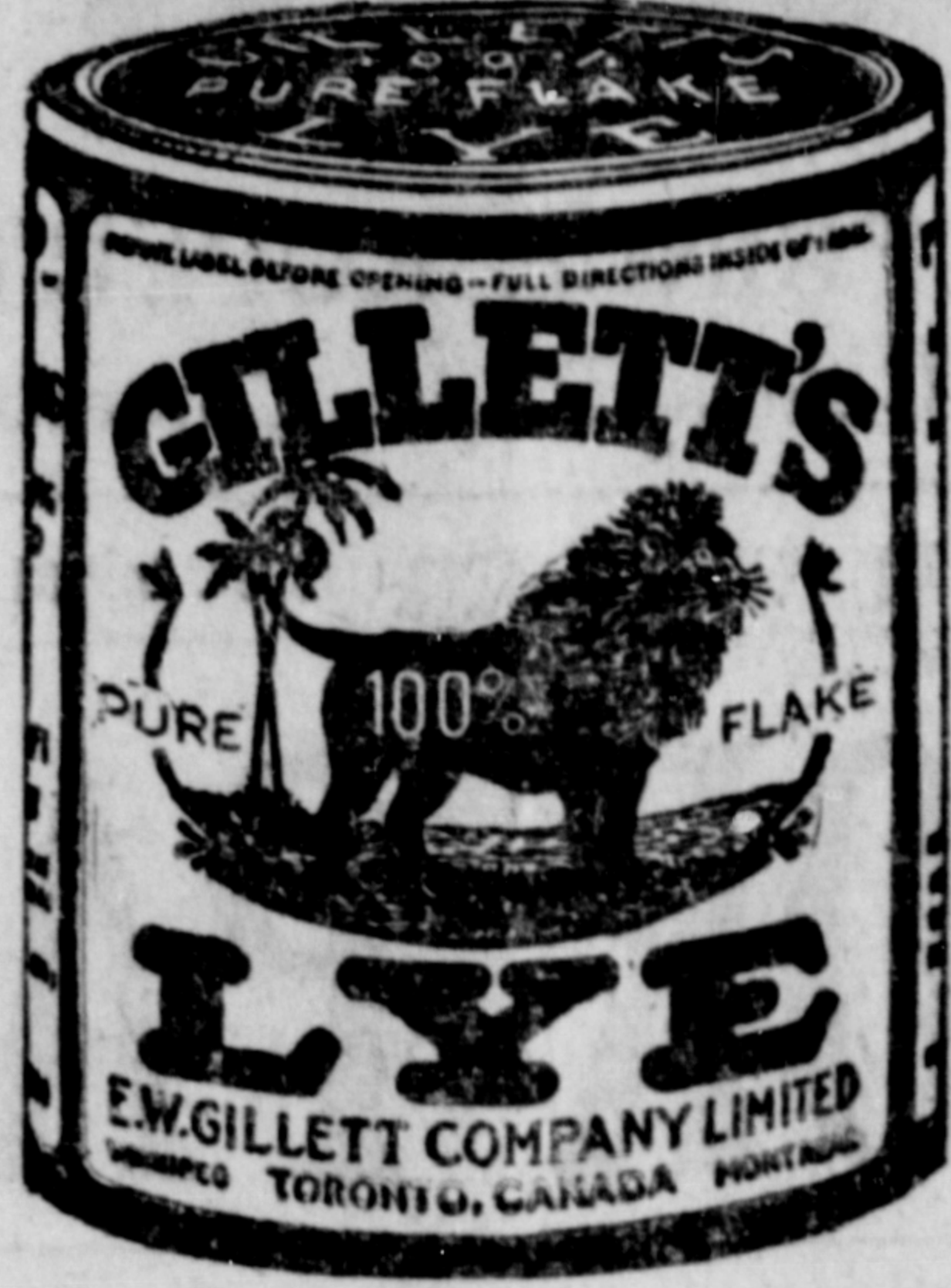
Provincial Ministers Coming Next Week.

Two provincial ministers are to visit Prince Rupert next week during the course of a tour of northern British Columbia. Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, will doubtless go north to Portland Canal points and probably will visit the interior. Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, has not yet seen some of the newer public works which have been completed such as the Terrace bridge.

Both ministers are in control of departments of the government, which are very important to Prince Rupert and district and doubtless every effort will be made to show them the developments which are going on and to enlist their sympathies with new projects. Incidentally, too, they will be suitably entertained.

There is at present no provincial election pending and all will be able to unite to make the reception of the ministers as impressive as possible. Unfortunately, Hon. T. D. Pattullo will not be able to come. Duties of his department call him elsewhere.

"HIS HOUR" PROVES TO BE FASCINATING PICTURE

Film Shown Last Night Will be Repeated Tonight at Westholme Theatre

The picture shown last night tells of Tamara Lorraine, a lovely young English widow, while travelling through Egypt, very informally meets Gritzko Milaslavski, a Russian prince. Gritzko, the most popular man in all Russia, is immediately fascinated but she rebukes his advances until they are formally introduced at the Khedive's ball, given for the titled visitors from Russia. Eager to arouse Tamara's jealousy, Gritzko becomes very attentive to Tatiane Shebanoff who has adored him for a long time, but Tamara misunderstands his attention as an attempt to humiliate her.

When the two men fight a duel to decide who is to dance the cotillon at the court ball with Tamara, she is so upset that she begs her godmother to allow her to return to England. However, the Princess suggests that instead she will take a party to Moscow and exclude Gritzko, who hears of the plan and boards the same train.

Tamara's godmother had always hoped for a romance between the beautiful girl and brilliant prince, and realizing that the two are really very much in love with each other, sets about handling the situation. She continues giving a round of gay parties and social affairs in Moscow and the two grow more interested in each other.

Gritzko kidnaps Tamara one night while driving her home from a ball and takes her to his cabin. She faints from fright, and shock and regains consciousness to have Gritzko say, "Madame, I ask you graciously to accord me the honor of your hand in marriage." Feeling there is no other way out she consents, and his hour has come.

Weeks later, after the formal court wedding of the Prince and Tamara, all misunderstandings are cleared up and they realize they love each other deeply and truly.

CORINNE GRIFFITH LOVE'S WILDERNESS

Comeliness Leads to Difficulties in Recent Film Shown This Week

Later, in a sequence of elaborate scenes depicting the South Sea Islands, she returns to her gorgeous costumes, for which she is noted, and again rises to emotional heights when she discovers herself bigamously married.

THUNDERING HERD IS BUFFALO STORY

Tells in Picture of the Slaughter of the American Bison That Roamed Plains

"The Thundering Herd," is a vigorous mixture of entertainment and instruction, of history and fiction. It has tremendous dramatic value, yet the thrilling story it narrates, the adventures and incidents it unfolds and the scenes it pictures are based upon facts that are historically true.

The photoplay was adapted from the absorbing novel of the same name by Zane Grey and centers around the glamorous and colorful days of 1876. Mr. Grey knows the west in the early days as do few others, and Lucien Hubbard, who scenarized the story and William K. Howard who directed it have been careful to follow the novel down to its minutest details.

Instead of viewing a plain dotted with cities, ranches and cement roads, the film shows us the west as it was fifty years ago—a vast wilderness, ranged by great herds of buffalo, overrun by wolves, bears and mountain lions and inhabited by fierce nomadic Indians.

Interwoven with the theme of the story which concerns the long drive that was begun in '76 to the buffalo fields of Wyoming and Montana, is a virile romance, the principals of which are Jack Holt and Lois Wilson. The development of this love affair which is hindered by Miss Wilson's guardian, Noah Beery, and the sufferings and privations of the early settlers provide enough action, drama and suspense for a half a dozen photoplays. The last big Indian attack upon the whites and the exciting stampede of a vast herd of buffalo furnish two of the many dynamic scenes for this epic picture.

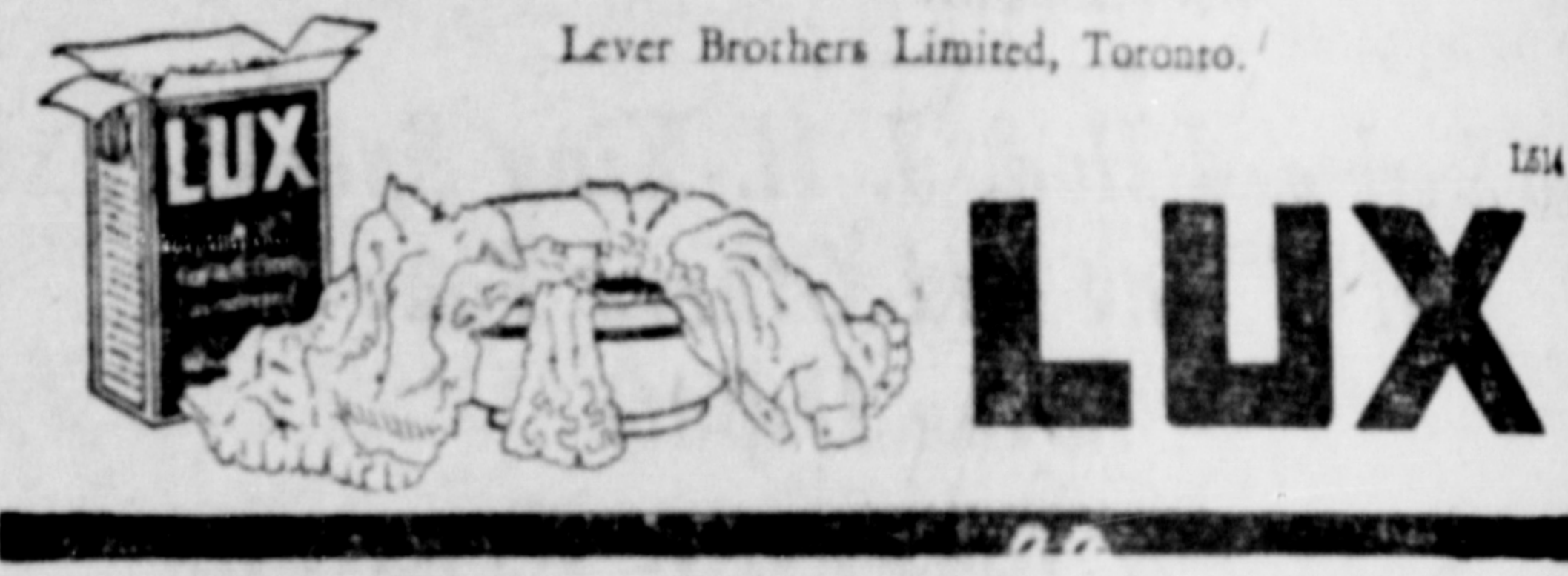
