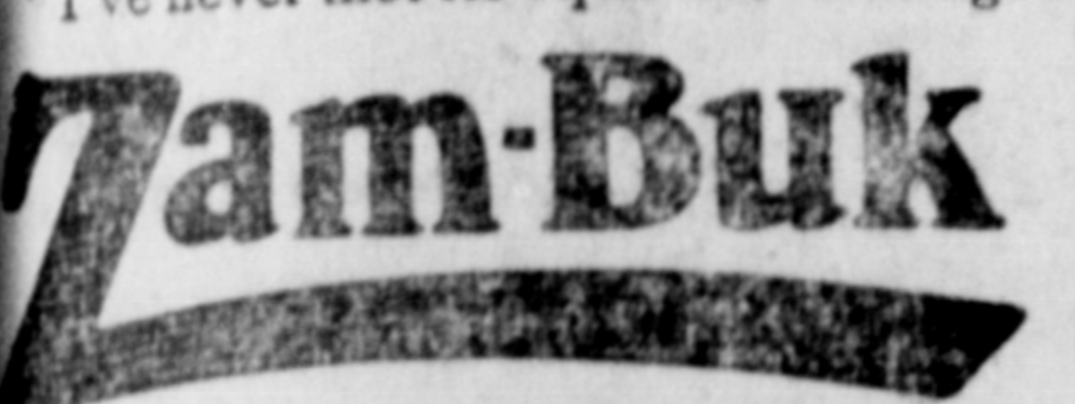


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PRINCE RUPERT BEAT CLAXTON

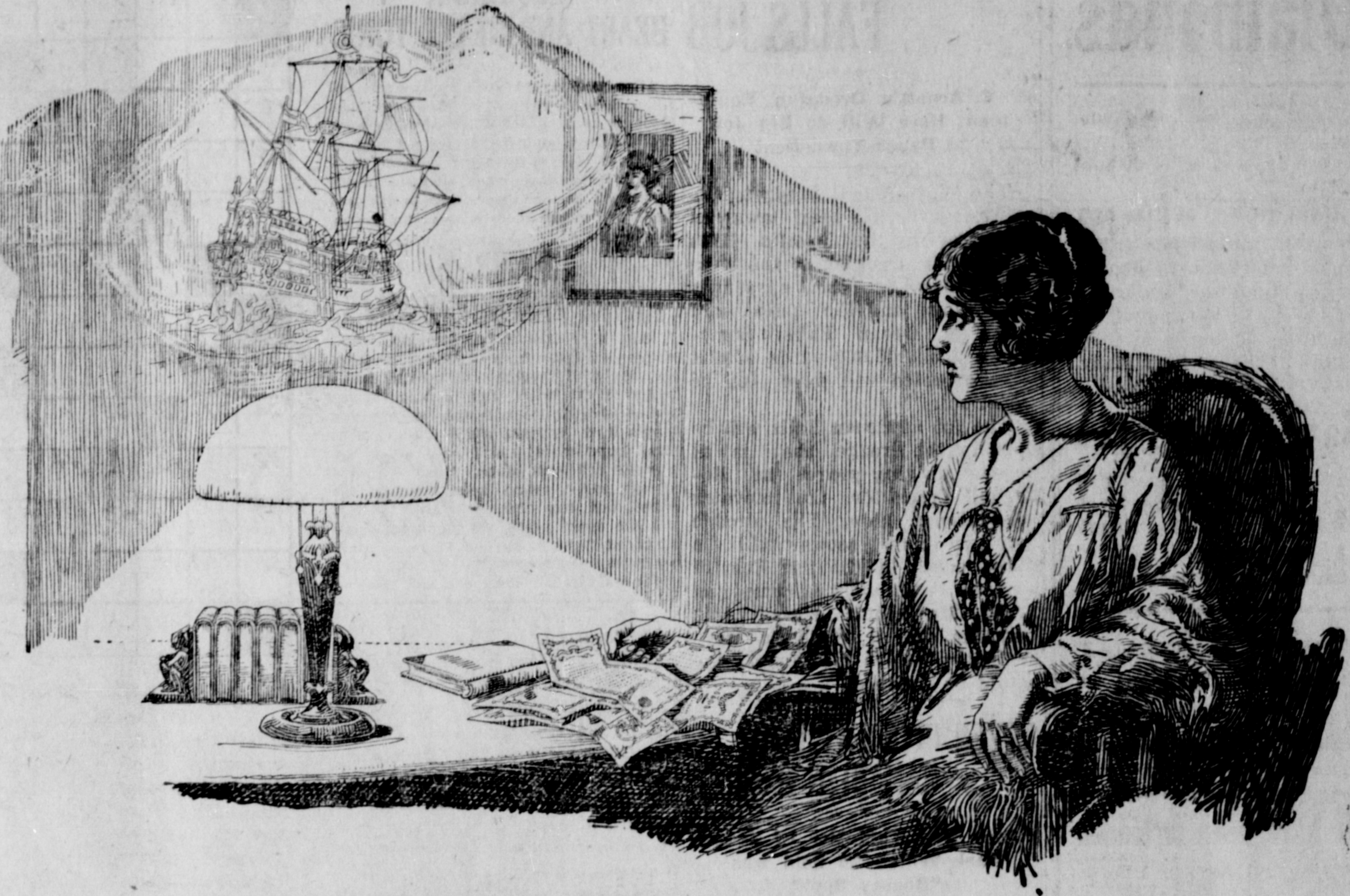
Team in Callies' Colors Beat That in Sons of England by 6 to 4

Jimmie McAleenan's imported baseball players did not come up to expectation in their first game against Hyder on Sunday, May 18, although the match played that day was one of the most exciting and keenly contested affairs ever staged in the Portland Canal Country. Stewart having been beaten by 20 to 2 in the first game of the season the

week preceding, Jimmie sent a wire to Vancouver to "Babe" Fortin asking him to rush north with another pair of baseballers. In response to this, "Babe," accompanied by his brother, Ed, and Bill Stickney, arrived on the scene Sunday morning. The game that afternoon was to have gone five innings but when the fifth inning was ended the teams were tied two all. Five more innings were played before Hyder got in the necessary run to win the game and cop a large amount of money which is said to have been bet on the match.

Just a little later this year than usual, the City League baseball schedule will start on Thursday of this week. As had been anticipated there are three clubs in the league this season—Sons of Canada, Sawmill and Gyro Club. The first game on Thursday evening will be between the Sons of Canada and the Mill, the second on Tuesday next between the lumber men and the Gyro Club and the third on Friday week between the Canucks and Gyros. The three aggregations, it is understood, are pretty well balanced, an ef-

fort having been made to make them so in order that an interesting series may be played. The Gyros will use the uniforms that last year contained the men of the aggregation known as Gil's. The full league schedule will be issued in a few days.

Three former Prince Rupert football players are captains this year of the three teams playing in the Senior soccer league at Anyox. Eddie Craggs, formerly of the Sons of England here, is captain of the Beach team; Jock Campbell, formerly of the Callies, leads the Smelter team while the Mine eleven is piloted by Bob Stewart formerly of the Sons of Canada. Other former local players engaged in soccer at Anyox this season are Jimmie Mitchell who is with the Smelter and Les Lane with the Mine. George Sellars is not playing football at the smelter town this season although they have been trying to tempt him back on the field again. Games are played twice a week—Tuesdays and Fridays—and, as a result of the six games so far played this season, the Smelter is ahead with the Mine second and Beach third.

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
