**GRAPPLE WITH GOD IN HEAVEN**

**Appeal Against Religion Made by Zenovieff on Behalf of Communists**

The Victoria Colonist commenting on a recent tirade against religion by the communists of Russia says:

The recent Christmastide was again seized upon by the Bolsheviks of Russia to give a new impetus to their war against religion. They mobilized the "Youthful Communists" to divert the Christmas celebrations into anti-religious channels, but these were ordered to avoid the crude obscenities which have marked their conduct in the past. M. Zinovieff, who appears to be one of the leaders of the anti-religious war, admits that the campaign has failed hitherto, but he says the Communists are undaunted and issues the following appeal:

We will grapple with the Lord God in due season. We will vanquish Him in His Highest Heaven and wherever He seeks refuge and we will subdue Him for ever. But we must understand that in our backward peasant country, where we are only as yet at the beginning of our work of culture and education, we must be cautious—much, much more cautious than hitherto.

**Control Holidays**

The Christmas campaign was carried out by the Soviet Press in a species of propaganda in which stress was laid on the impossibility of abolishing deep-rooted popular holidays, and the advice was tendered that the Communists should make efforts to gain control of these and convert them into Communist holidays. There were large quantities of anti-religious agitation literature distributed in the villages of the country and a society of anti-God workers was formed to bring the movement under one central authority. Up-to-date all the efforts of the Communists in this direction have been responsible alone for mere anti-religious hoodlumism which has tended to produce the opposite results to those sought. It has had no effect whatever on the peasantry, and there is no longer a cultured class in Russia, as it was necessary that this class should be wiped out prior to the campaign against religion.

**CANADIAN ROVER IS GONE TO VANCOUVER**

Wallace's Shipyard to Make Repairs on Vessel Which Went Ashore

The contract for making repairs to C.G.M.M. freighter Canadian Rover, which went ashore near Ocean Falls last week, has been let to Wallace's of North Vancouver and the vessel sailed from the local dry dock this morning for the south. She should reach Vancouver on Saturday.

The job on the Rover consists of repairing a damaged stem and replacing seven plates. Wallace's, it is stated, gave a very low figure.
