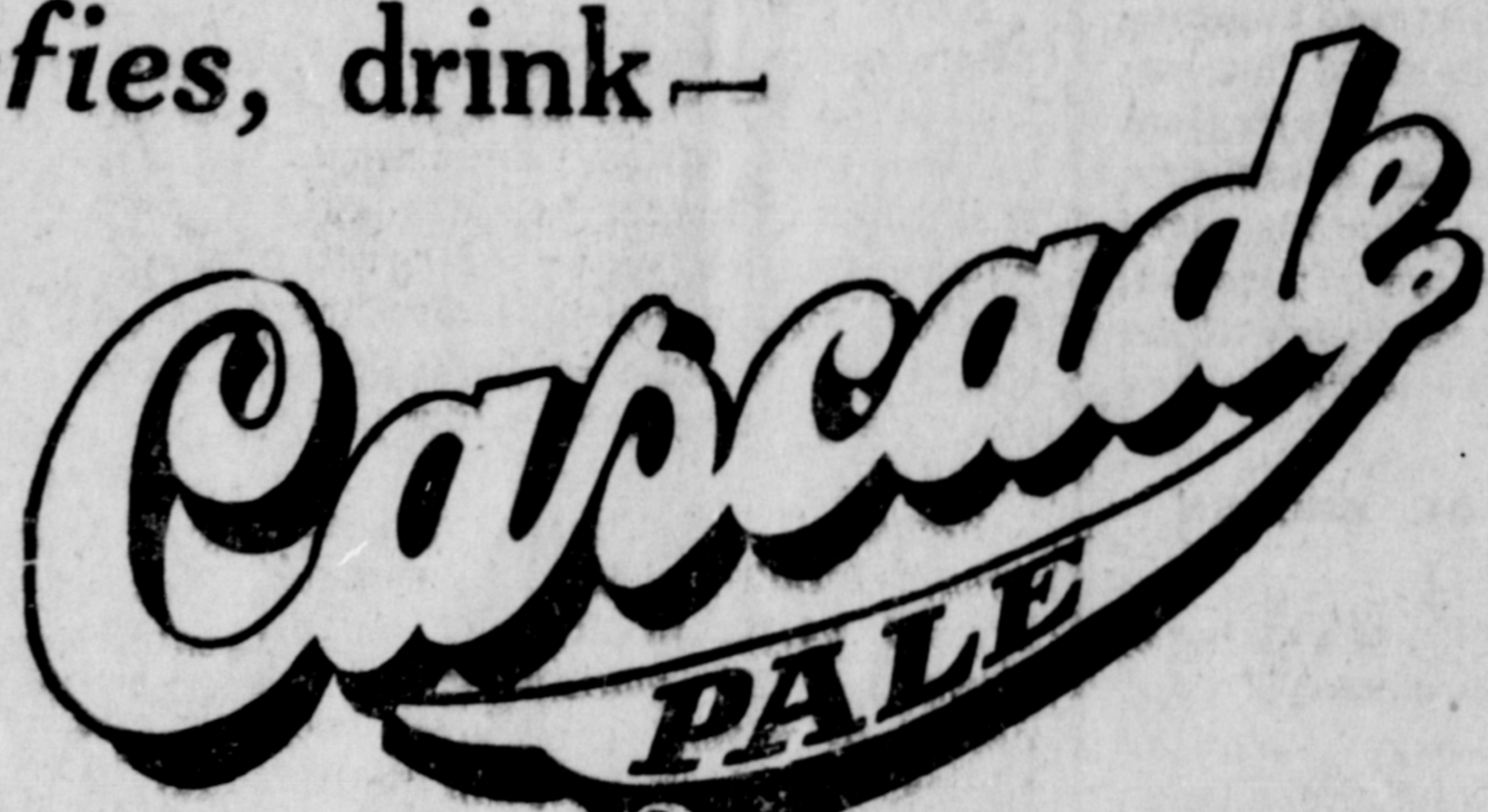

Sport Chat

Should the Colts win tonight's senior basketball games from the Elks, the latter team and the Sons of Canada will be tied in first place. In any case, there is going to be an interesting battle from now until the end of the season between the Canucks and the lodge men for championship honors. The intermediate league game tonight between the Colts and Groffo should also be an interesting affair. With the tobaccoists holding first place just now with a one game lead, the Colts have a good chance to share that position. The third game of the evening will be one of those ever popular Junior League affairs between the Colts and Tiny Tims.

After a nine-year lapse, the Negro has again come to take a leading place in pugilistic circles in the United States. With Jess Willard's victory over Jack Johnson, then heavyweight champion, in 1915, the white race recaptured its leadership. Jack Dempsey has now held the title since 1919 and in that time he has never met a negro. From present indications, the white champions must soon meet another galaxy of Negroes in the ring. Harry Wills, who has pursued Dempsey for several years, has conquered the only man who knocked the champion from the ring, Luis Firpo. Powerful and heavy, and by all means a boxer, Wills is heralded as the logical contender although he may have to meet Tom Gibbons of St. Paul first. In the middleweight division there is also looming a dusky figure, Tiger Flowers, an Atlanta negro, overcame the former champion, Johnny Wilson, in three rounds at Madison Square Garden this winter and he has declared his intention of drawing Harry Greb into a match for the title.
