New Halibut Boat
Jim Burns, an old timer in the halibut fishing, is the latest member of the home fleet to go into the fishing on his own account. Jim arrived in port on Wednesday aboard his own boat Yule, which he brought from Seattle, having purchased her there. The Yule is a husky looking 40 foot schooner with a 10 foot beam and is powered with a 16 horse power Enterprise heavy duty engine. The new boat will be taken up on the McLean ways in the near future to be finally rigged up in readiness for the opening of the halibut fishing season next month.

Skipper John Field is overhauling the engine on his tow boat Harlan F.

Messrs. J. and C. Currie are installing a 12-15 horse power Sterling engine in their power boat Ruby Mae in place of a former Frisbie engine. The Ruby Mae has been tied up for several weeks owing to having sustained a break in her crankshaft.

Fur Arrives
One of the largest consignments of raw fur to arrive in port this season was brought in early in the week by McFadden Bros., who have been trapping in the Gardner Canal district. Fine specimens of marten, mink and beaver were contained in the lot, which found a ready local market.

The halibut schooner Gibson, Capt. H. Newell, will be taken up on the McLean ways next week to have a raised deck built aft. Other minor repairs will also be carried out at the same time in readiness for the initial dash to the halibut banks next month.

Members of Local Union Ask That Instructor Be Appointed

The Prince Rupert Board of Trade is co-operating with the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union in regard to securing the establishment of a school of navigation here, particularly for the benefit of halibut fishermen. The action is being taken in response to a petition from a number of fishermen and endorsed by the union which asks that Capt. B. C. March be appointed. The following letter was read at last night's meeting:

"In view of the growing necessity to go farther and farther out in search of new halibut banks, we the undersigned members of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union beg to submit the following petition:

"Whereas it has been found necessary to fish for halibut farther from charted waters than heretofore;

"And whereas a proper knowledge of navigation, chart reading, compass adjustment, rule of the road, etc., has been found absolutely essential to the proper and safe navigation of the vessels;

"We would request that a night school for navigation be formed immediately at Prince Rupert for the remainder of the close season for halibut, that instructions in the above subjects may be given to those desiring such.

The petition was signed by J. H. Meagher, agent of the union.

**TELEGRAPH TOLLS TO

Committee of the Board of Trade to Investigate and Make Representations Asking for Lower Rates

At the suggestion of James Lee the matter of telegraph tolls is to be taken up with the companies by the trade and commerce committee of the Board of Trade. It was pointed out by him that the tolls from Prince Rupert to Eastern points were nearly double those from Vancouver to the same points. He quoted many of the rates to prove his assertion.

H. F. Pullen asked that the press rates be included in the representations. At present extortionate rates were charged, making it difficult for local papers to give the public a good service. If the rates were reduced in keeping with those elsewhere the people of Prince Rupert would get more news from the outside.
