

LIABILITY FOR FISHING LOSS

Judge Decides in Favor of Crew But Not as Precedent

Judgment dismissing the action of J. G. Gavigan, vs. H. E. Shepherd, in which the plaintiff attempted to establish the liability of the defendant as the member of a fishing boat crew in connection with a "hole" trip, was dismissed in the County Court this morning by Judge Young. The case was followed with interest by business as well as fishing interests of the city and was taken in the nature of a test although Judge Young, in giving judgment, asked that it not be regarded as a precedent.

According to the judgment, unless an expressed contract is made whereby the parties contract out of the Masters' and Servants' Act, it is deemed that the association is not a partnership and that individual members of the crew are not liable for losses incurred.

The action was brought by the plaintiff against the defendant in the attempt to make the latter liable for a share of the loss incurred during the operation of the halibut boat Dolphin, Capt. Byrne, on a "hole" trip in 1924.

Judge Young held that no contract had been proven by the plaintiff against the defendant. Under the Masters' and Servants' Act it was incumbent on the plaintiff to establish a partnership. This the plaintiff had failed to do.

The judge stated that he did not wish either the owners of boats or fishermen to take the decision as a precedent, but recommended in future cases of a like nature there should be a written contract whereby, if it was so desired, partnership could be established and the men made liable for share of losses as well as right to receive profits.

S. W. Taylor had the case for Mr. Gavigan while E. F. Jones represented Mr. Shepherd.

Over Two Hundred Thousand Pounds Sold at Prices Averaging Around 12c and 4c.
