**REACHED HIGHEST
 GOAL IN PICTURES
 WITHIN SIX MONTHS**

Hugh Allan Left High School
 Two Years Ago and is Now
 Mary Pickford's Leading
 Man

HOLLYWOOD, May 4. —
 Fairy tales do come true. Hugh
 Allan, former Oakland, Califor-
 nia high school boy who played
 his first bit in pictures six
 months ago, can so testify.

For he has just signed a con-
 tract to play as Mary Pickford's
 leading man in "Little Annie
 Rooney."

Hugh could scarcely believe it
 himself, after he had signed the
 dotted line, but he reached the
 goal that scores of young men in
 pictures have not attained in
 years of work — the honor of
 playing opposite Mary Pickford
 — and did it in six months.

Two years ago he was gradu-
 ated from Fremont high school
 in Oakland. He worked for the
 Cunard line in San Francisco for
 a time, then came to Los An-
 geles as secretary to Leland
 Ramsdell, producer of Hollywood
 Photoplay Productions. Later he
 became assistant cameraman and
 film editor. Then he was offer-
 ed a bit in a Richard Talmadge
 film.

That was last summer. Small
 parts he took in "Sally" and
 "De classe" won him a five year
 contract with First National.

Allan's real name is Allan
 Bugnes, because Lloyd Hughes
 is also under contract to First
 National, Allen Hughes became
 Hugh Allan.

In seeking a leading man who
 is over six feet tall, young and
 handsome, Miss Pickford saw
 screen tests of Allan and he was
 signed immediately for the lead-
 ing male role in "Little Annie
 Rooney," which is now in pro-
 duction at the Pickford lot.

"I can't believe it is true,"
 said Allan as he went to work
 with "America's Sweetheart."

**WHITE SISTER
 TALE OF LOVE**

Story of Self-Sacrifice Showing
 Eruption of Mount Vesuvius

Angela Chairmonte is the
 youngest daughter of an Italian
 prince. She is in love with Gio-
 vanni Severi and because of this
 love, her older sister, the Mar-
 celsa, is jealous of her. During
 a storm, Angela's father is killed
 and because of the machinations
 of her sister, Angela finds her-
 self penniless, homeless, an out-
 cast. She only has the love of
 Giovanni to sustain her. For a
 time she is happy, but Giovanni
 is suddenly called to military
 duty and sent to Africa where
 he is head of a small expedition
 sent there to fight the Arabs.
 News reaches Angela in Rome
 that Giovanni has been killed.
 Her last hope for happiness is
 gone and only the encourage-
 ment of Mgr. Saracinesca keeps
 her up.

She Renounces the World

She tells the priest she wants
 to do something to help others,
 now that her own interesting life
 is at an end. He urges her to
 enter the convent of the White
 Sisters, where in a sequence of
 magnificent scenes, she is
 shown passing through her
 novitiate, and later, taking her
 vows. Shortly after she has
 become an eternal member of the
 order of the White Sisters, Gio-
 vanni returns from the Arabian
 captivity which detained him for
 three years in Italy.

He calls at the hospital of the
 White Sisters to visit his brother,
 an Italian scientist, who has
 been experimenting in an ef-
 fort to forecast volcanic eruptions.
 There he recognizes Ang-
 ela in her nun's garb. She
 faints and afterwards is told
 that her marriage to the church
 is just as sacred as if she had
 married another man while Gio-
 vanni was missing and he must
 respect the veil she has taken.

Trapped in the Observatory

Through a subterfuge, Gio-
 vanni arranges for Angela to
 come to his brother's laboratory
 on the slope of Mt. Vesuvius.
 There he locks the door and
 tries to prevail upon her to sign
 a paper asking the Pope to free
 her. She admits she loves him,
 but tells him that she must cling
 to her vows. Then he permits
 her to go.

Later Mt. Vesuvius bursts into
 eruption. Giovanni drives
 through the towns below to
 warn the inhabitants and suc-
 ceeds in saving them. But in a
 flood, caused by the bursting of
 a reservoir through which the
 volcanic eruption has flown, Gio-
 vanni is killed and the populace,
 lifting their faces to Heaven,
 thank God for the sacrifice the
 White Sister and her lover have
 made.

**CLASSMATES MILITARY
 IN ITS CHARACTER**

Shows Life of Cadets at West
 Point Academy and Some
 Splendid Drilling

"Classmates," the First Na-

**SOUTH SEA ISLANDS
 IN LATEST PICTURE**

"As Man Desires" is Story of
 India and Tahiti with
 Dramatic Climax

Captain Milton Sills brings the
 good ship Drama safely across
 the shoals of tragedy once again
 in his latest First National pic-
 ture, "As Man Desires," which
 comes here for the midweek.

The salt tang of the South
 Seas mingles with the mysticism
 of the Orient in this strange
 romance, adapted from Gene
 Wright's novel, "Pandora La
 Croix." Sills and Viola Dana
 occupy the center of interest.

Unlike "The Sea Hawk," how-
 ever, this production introduces
 Sills as a British army surgeon
 in the Indian service. It shows
 him falsely emmeshed in a mur-
 der by a woman who had failed
 in forcing her love upon him,
 and compelled to flee for his
 life.

It picks him up again as a
 swashbuckling captain of a dingy
 pearl fishing schooner in the
 South Sea Islands, giving two-
 fist, six-shooting battle for
 pearl bed rights and hating all
 women because of the one who
 had betrayed him.

Then, into his life stepped a
 dusky, beautiful and coquettish
 native dancing girl of Tahiti, en-
 acted by Viola Dana. Driven to
 the depths of human degrada-
 tion, Sills marries the sportive
 creature, contemptuously pro-
 mising to make a "fine lady" of
 her.

Meantime, however, his name
 has been cleared of the Indian
 murder and search instituted for
 him by the girl he really loves,
 the daughter of a fellow officer.
 How they finally meet, and their
 pathway to happiness is cleared
 by a bullet which pierces the
 heart of his dancing girl bride
 comes as a dramatic climax to
 the vivid story.
