PHILIPPOPOLIS, Bulgaria, Mar. 5.—Nedig Evzad Hanum, the fifth and favorite wife of the deposed Khalif, passed through the railroad station here on the Simplon express the other day to rejoin her husband, the old Turk who is spending his declining days in Switzerland.

Nedig, who took no pains to keep her face veiled as she leaned out of the window of her compartment at the station, is strikingly beautiful, with blue eyes at variance with the American idea of Orientals. She is just twenty years old. When the Sultan was deposed and banished last year, Mustapha Kemal refused to let Nedig join him in his exile. Nedig Evzad Hanum, however, would not be permanently parted from the ex-Khalif, and she made so many personal applications to Mustapha Kemal for permission to join her husband in his banishment that he finally relented.

AUTO IN ENGLAND FOR EVERY EIGHTY
Increase Last Year Added Seven Million Dollars to Revenue

LONDON, Mar. 6.—England began the year 1925 with nearly 80,000 more private automobiles than were in use a year ago, according to recent announcement of the ministry of transport. This brings the total number of private motor-cars to more than 460,000, making one person out of every 80 the owner of an automobile.

At the beginning of 1924 there were 384,000 cars on the road in this country, the proportion being one owner out of every 100 of the population. The increase in the number of cars will

KING OF BULGARIA ENTERTAINS GUESTS

SOPIA, March 6.—One of the indications of returning normality in Bulgarian affairs is the resumption of the entertaining of cabinet ministers and foreign diplomats by King Boris.

Last winter the king resumed diplomatic dinners on a modest scale for the first time since the World War, and the return to this practice on a larger scale than last year is regarded here as a step in the right direction.

A feature of these events is the atmosphere of informality that characterizes them. King Boris talks freely with his guests.

Toasts Proposed

The toast to the dads was proposed by Jim Parker, who proceeded in lighter vein to tell the dads how to get into the good graces of their sons. Concluding his remarks: "Dads, the requirements of your job in regard to your sons are stricter and harder to administer faithfully than the Ten Commandments. You must be a human cash register! To unblock, a policeman to arrest, a judge to sentence, a warden to imprison, a governor to pardon, a companion to amuse, a guardian to guide and besides you must have sympathy and sternness, kindness and a strong right arm, patience and a hickory switch. The man who has received his honorable discharge from the army of dads has received a fellowship in the college of life and has got a white pass through the golden gates of time with baggage exempt from customs."

In replying to the toast E. Cameron, with characteristic humor and seriousness blended in just the right proportions, voiced the gratefulness of the dads at having the rare privilege of meeting with their sons in this way and stressed the all important goal of life, that of character, which could not be bought by cold cash but had to be acquired by experience.

Principal Speaker

In calling upon the main speaker of the evening, the chairman remarked that it was a treat indeed to have a man of Rev. W. E. Galloway's caliber and ability as the guest of honor and assured the lads and dads that the address to follow would be well worth their interest and attention.

Rev. Galloway lived up to all advance expectations and produced the goods. His address was masterful and convincing. For three quarters of an hour the speaker held his audience in rapt attention and carried his points home in no uncertain manner. It was a revelation to both fathers and sons. Stressing the relationship of father and son as a true business proposition, in which the spirit of co-operation ruled over that of competition, a circumstance that is being recognized more forcibly in the business world today, the speaker suggested the firm name of "Father, Son and Company" as being more unselfish and productive of finer community spirit than the meager results arising from such firms
