**BONUS EFFECT ON CANADIAN PORTS SHOWN**

Should Satisfy People of Maritime Provinces Thinks Edmonton Newspaper

The bonus to be paid by the Dominion government to the Peterson Company will apply only to boats sailing from Canadian ports, such ports to be designated by the Minister of Trade and Commerce, says an Edmonton paper. One incidental effect of the arrangement will be to help direct the out-going and in-coming trade of the country through the Canadian ports on the St. Lawrence, the Atlantic and the Pacific coasts. For a beginning the Peterson company is to put ten ships in the service, and ten more when required. Twenty Government Merchant Marine vessels are also to go into the trade. From thirty to forty ships will therefore operate from Canadian ports on either coast under government-controlled rates. That number should be sufficient not only to exert a modifying influence upon rates charged by competing vessels, but to deflect both export and import trade to a considerable degree from United States to Canadian ports.

**Wanted Action**

The people of the Maritime provinces have been appealing recently for action of some kind which would give them a fair share of the Canadian-made traffic which now passes through the harbors of New England.

Vancouver and Victoria claim that they are losing business which should belong to them, through competition from Seattle and Portland, and fear that they may lose more. On either coast the proposal has found favor that the tariff preference allowed on British goods should apply only when those goods enter at a Canadian port. The conditions upon which the bonus is being given will go a good way to accomplish the purpose of holding Canadian trade to Canadian routes and terminals. If in addition to that, parliament should see fit to restrict the preference to goods coming in through Canadian ports, the people of the far eastern provinces and of British Columbia will find their wishes granted in a very substantial measure. Even without interference with the preferential tariff, a fleet of three dozen ships sailing all the year round from Canadian ports must make an appreciable difference in the volume of trade flowing through these outlets and inlets.

**GERMANS OUST BRITISH FROM OWN MARKETS**

Are Selling Steel to India Where They Have Outbid Their Rivals

LEEDS, England, March 6.—British steel manufacturers have found difficulty in selling steel in their own territory, India, because they have been outbid by the Germans and Belgians; it was announced here by A. M. Samuel, parliamentary secretary to the Department of Overseas Trade, addressing the Leeds Chamber of Commerce. The situation which brought this about, said Mr. Samuel, was the high price of coal. The price of steel, which was largely dependent on the price of coal, was so high today that it paid to import steel from abroad. Two or three shillings per ton off the price of coal, he suggested, would make all the difference to the prosperity of British trade, and the existing high price of coal was doing harm which extended much farther than to the 100,000 men who were out of work in the coal fields.

Mr. Samuels, however, was quite optimistic as to the future for British trade generally. With the exception of coal, steel and shipping, he believed that the clouds of trade were breaking, and that there would be a re-awakening of prosperity for all and particularly the workman. With about 1,250,000 men unemployed there was much misery, but through the whole policy of existing government ran the motive of getting the people back to work. He could see in trade today a greater spirit of confidence.

WINNIPEG, Mar. 6.—British subjects predominate in a large party of immigrants now en route to Winnipeg over the Canadian National railways, according to information reaching officials of the company here. The party, numbering over 150 are travelling in special coaches attached to the Continental Limited due at Winnipeg tomorrow evening and are from the steamships Regina, Athena and Larenia. Included in the group from these vessels are a special Salvation Army party travelling in a special tourist car and another party of women in a second special tourist car.
