

FINANCES OF THE HOSPITAL

Healthy Condition Shown in Report Presented Last Night

The financial statement for the Prince Rupert General Hospital for the year 1924 submitted at the annual meeting last night showed the institution to be in a healthy financial condition with liquid assets at the end of the year standing at something over \$7,000, including accounts receivable worth 100c on the dollar and cash on hand.

Mr. Campbell, continuing, went into details of the report, mimeographed copies of which were furnished the meeting. Accounts written off totalled \$13,000, many of which it was felt might still be collectable.

Among the more important items of expenditure on the statement of general revenue account were the following:

Collecting Accounts

Mr. Campbell, having entered into a defence of the action of the hospital finance committee in placing long due accounts in the hands of an international collecting agency, there was some discussion in the meeting on this matter.

In bringing the discussion on the financial report to a close, President D. C. McRae pointed out that the \$13,000 that had been written off had included accounts of a number of patients who rightly should be in an incurable hospital or old man's home.

ANNUAL REPORT ON HOSPITAL

Retiring President, D. C. McRae, Tells of Splendid Work Being Done

In submitting his report for 1924 at the sixteenth annual meeting of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association last night D. C. McRae, the retiring president, announced that 912 patients had received treatment in the hospital during the year. Of this total, 713 patients had been from the city and 199 from outside points.

Due to the fact that hospital membership fees had been reduced during the year from \$5 to \$2, the object of increasing revenue and general interest for the institution had been realized. This year \$227.50 had been derived from fees which was \$200 better than the average for past years.

During the past year, the Nurses' Home had been completed. On completion it had cost \$20,165 with a mortgage of \$5,000 against it and \$834 due the bank.

From a fire hazard standpoint, the year had seen a great improvement at the hospital. The sterilizing equipment in the operating room had been converted from gasoline to electricity and financed by the city.

During the year, the X-ray equipment at the hospital had been considerably renovated and extended. The cost had been \$3,500 of which \$2,500 had already been paid.

Notwithstanding extra expenditures, the finances of the hospital were in a satisfactory condition, Mr. McRae's report con-
