

LAKE FISH IS BEING SHIPPED

Business of Canadian National Express of Varied Nature is Explained
PRINCE RUPERT FIGURES

WINNIPEG, Feb. 12. — Manitoba goldeyes succulent white fish, Tullibies and other toothsome members of the finny tribe to the amount of more than six million pounds moved by express from Western Canada to the fresh fish markets of eastern Canada and the United States during the period November 15, 1923 to March 1, 1924, according to figures presented today by G. E. Bellerose, general superintendent of transportation to a regional meeting of Canadian National Express company officials from all parts of western Canada. As a result of providing a refrigerator car express service which places fish on the New York markets on the third morning after leaving Winnipeg a better market has been created for the products of western lakes. With consequent benefit to those engaged in the fishing industry in western Canada. From Manitoba lakes more than five and a half million pounds of fish was expressed, an increase of a million pounds over the shipments of 1923. A healthy increase is expected also from the 1925 movement.

Prince Rupert
From Prince Rupert 1008 carloads containing 22,839,667 lbs. of fish were handled by express during the short season due to enforcement of the closed season agreed to in the halibut treaty.

The meeting of express officials was held for the purpose of considering any further improvements which could be made in the express service provided by Canadian National Railways for the shipping public. Representatives were in attendance from all parts of the western region while Mr. Bellerose represented the headquarters officers. The meeting was held under the presidency of C. E. Cunningham, general superintendent Western region on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

Odd Shipments
Other important movements by express, Mr. Bellerose stated during the discussions were silver and black foxes of which 8,122 were handled without a single loss. Lobsters from the maritime provinces of which 1,600,000 pounds were shipped, some coming as far west as Winnipeg. Race horses, show animals and work horses which were handled in specially equipped cars between all parts of the Dominion. Fruit from Ontario, British Columbia and the Maritime provinces to the amount of 35,000,000 pounds. Better business during 1925 is confidently expected according to speakers at the three day conference.

EDMONTON PRICES PAID FOR RAW FURS

A Fifteen Per Cent Drop in Week Result of News From East

Prices obtained at the Edmonton Fur Exchange averaged possibly fifteen per cent lower than those of the previous week, says the Edmonton Journal. The results of the large eastern auctions, it is said, are plainly noticeable in the quotations on local offerings. Furs are still coming in to the local market in fairly satisfactory quantities, although practically none of the northern catch has as yet made its appearance. The situation locally is rather quiet at the present time, as a number of the outside buyers have been attracted by the eastern sales. It is stated by dealers in the city that the trade from now on will be on a somewhat healthier basis, as it is felt that the prices now obtaining are fairly well on a level with those in outside markets.
