

## TRIBUNE NOT YET SATISFIED

Vancouver Paper Says its Knows More About Janet Smith Case Than it Publishes.

It is a great pity, in the interests of justice, that Janet Smith, and not Wong Foon Sing, was murdered in the Baker mansion on Shaughnessy Heights on July 29, says the Saturday Tribune. Had it been the Chinaman who was murdered, the mystery would have been solved long ago. The Chinese consulate, backed by the Vancouver daily press, by Chinatown and its flood of gold, would have insisted that justice be done. Janet Smith's big mistake in life was that she was born in Scotland instead of Hong-Kong or Shanghai.

The Vancouver Daily Province and The Sun are mightily perturbed about the abduction of Wong Foon Sing. They have awakened from their slumber to demand that British justice be vindicated. Only a week or two ago The Sun was suggesting that it would be a good thing if the community were to forget all about the Janet Smith case. But it is all fussed up and hollering its head off now about the rights and wrongs of Wong Foon Sing. Truly, we have a remarkable daily press in Vancouver.

### All Stories are Wrong

The Tribune frankly admits it knows a great deal more about the "mystery of Wong Foon Sing than it has ever told. Every daily newspaper story in regard to the surrender of Wong Foon Sing is untrue. Not five per cent. of all the hazardings and imaginings of The Province and The Sun in regard to Wong Foon Sing's abduction come within the range of being good guesses. The other ninety-five per cent. are wild and foolish guesses.

Since Wong Foon Sing has been taken by the authorities and placed on trial, The Tribune has been in receipt of further communications from the spokesman of the kidnappers of Wong Foon Sing.

### What Kidnapper Says

"We wish it known to the public," states this man, "that at the time Wong Foon Sing left our hands he had no marks of violence upon him, and had received no illusus. The photograph which we sent to the Saturday Tribune shows that he was in good condition at that time, and he has been kept in good condition ever since. If the newspaper reports are true that he was suffering from a blackened eye and a cut on his skull when taken to Okalla jail, those injuries must have been given him after he passed out of our care. We are at a loss to understand—if the report is true—the motive for ill-using this man, who at the time he passed out of our hands showed every sign of being ready to unburden himself voluntarily."
