ROUNSEFELL TO STUDY HERRING

Collaborator With W. F. Thompson the Halibut Man Gets New Appointment

In the development of the Alaska herring fisheries, lack of definite knowledge of the life, habits and movements of the fish has heretofore been a most serious drawback, says the Pacific Fisherman. This has been felt by the industry from the beginning, as it has been possible to locate herring runs only by costly individual prospecting, while the calculation of prospects for succeeding seasons has been based entirely on guesswork and past experience. The results have, on several occasions, been fairly disastrous, due to failure of expected runs; and ability to forecast the supply of fish with any sort of accuracy would enable the industry to avoid heavy losses. That this can be successfully done is indicated by the experience of the Norwegian fisheries.

Proper Regulations

The need of such knowledge has also been emphasized by the difficulty of making proper regulations. It has seemed evident that some regulation was needed, but there has been very little definite information to indicate the nature and extent of regulation desirable, with the result that various operators have suffered more or less hardship through frequent changes in restrictions.

The Bureau of Fisheries has for some time seen the need for a systematic study of the Alaska herring, and the Commissioner of Fisheries has been anxious to have this work undertaken. Preliminary arrangements have just been made to do so by Dr. Willis H. Rich of the Bureau, who was sent to the coast primarily for this purpose. He has secured the services of G. A. Rounsefell, who will begin the investigation during the coming summer, which he will spend in Alaska, collecting material and data in the principal herring districts.

Stanford Student

BIG WOLF HUNT VILNA FARMERS

Famous Campaign in Which Seventeen Ferocious Animals Fell

Particulars of the big wolf hunt at Vilna, Alberta, in which seventeen of the big animals were slain, are now to hand. Following a conference of the farmers and others of the district nearby 37 wolf hunters each with a .30,30 rifle and enough ammunition for a battle started out at four o'clock last Saturday morning to run down the marauding wood giants. Captain Bell picked out his lieutenants, allotted to each a particular territory, gave directions as to lines of march, signals, manoeuvres and general tactics, and after the singing of "O, Canada," and the shouting of an improvised yell the refrain of which was "Wolves, Wolves, We'll Eat You Up," the army of destruction set out.

Captain Bell divided his company into three sections: One to scout the brush line west of the Chain of Lakes, one the poplar groves west of Folly Lake and the third, a squad of sharpshooters to bring up the rear. Cross firing was strictly forbidden; the idea was to scare the wolves into the open where they could be easily accounted for by the sharpshooters; and the plan succeeded almost miraculously.

Captain Kills First

The first wolf to bite the snow fell to rise no more from a bullet through the brain from the captain's rifle. Leslie Southwell won his spurs by bowing over wolf No. 2. Orist Mikitka accounted for the third victim, after which, firing and killing went on so fast that it was impossible to say who was successful and who was not.

By 11 a.m. 13 timber wolves lay stiff and ferocious looking even in death on the frozen snow, while seven and twenty hungry hunters hastened in response to the captain's bugle call, to the sunny summit of Lone Dog's hill where a substantial hot meal was enjoyed.

Four More Wolves Slain

After two hours rest the drive took a northeasterly direction and at 1 p.m. four more wolves were slain, after which Captain Bell again assembled his forces on the highway at Skunk Valley where six sleighs were waiting to drive the weary soldiers into Vilna.

A never to be forgotten hunt is the verdict of all present.
