IMPRESSIONS OF THE EAST

W. E. Williams Tells Gyros
About Recent Trip to New
York and Other Cities

That a spirit of hero-worship inherent in the American people was a factor that was responsible for the accomplishment of miracles by those peoples was one of the impressions gained by W. E. Williams on his recent trip east he told the Gyro Club in an address delivered last night. The United States country advertised its great men on every hand and, by doing so, inspired its citizens to great accomplishments in emulation of them. Mr. Williams found the American people not of a miserly nature. Instead of merely investing their money they made it work. There was no such person there as the gentleman by profession as there was in European countries. Everywhere one went in the city of New York, on which Mr. Williams dealt principally, there were outstanding indications of how wealthy people distributed their money for the benefit of the race at large. The Americans considered themselves the freest people in the world. This might not be so but when ninety per cent of the immigrants coming into the country passed the Statue of Liberty on entering into their "land of dreams" an unforgettable impression was left with them. It was an impression that inspired its own fulfillment in their development as loyal citizens. There was much of the American spirit that Canadians might well emulate.

New York, Mr. Williams said, was a city of many superlatives.

It had the greatest population for its area of any place on the earth. There were more Jews there than in Judea and as many Irishmen as in the Irish Free State. On Manhattan Island there was more volume of building than anywhere else in the world of the same size. The architecture of the city was of such magnitude that it seemed to overwhelm the visitor. There was more useful and vain luxury in that city than anywhere else on earth and money moved in almost inconceivable volume.

Mr. Williams whose address was on "Impressions Gained in the East," also dealt with the city of Montreal and Ottawa in a humorous vein. He described in an interesting manner how he had spent New Year's Eve in the former city. He had never witnessed such a celebration as was staged in Canada's metropolis that night.
