WOLVES MENACE TO ALBERTANS

Chase Sleigh Loads of People;
Number Shot When Chasing
Man

EDMONTON, Mar. 17.—Word received here from Vilna indicates that timber wolves have overrun that part of Alberta and people in the district are afraid to go far at night. Dances and other evening engagements have been postponed.

Last week as a party of four were returning from a dance at Hamlin they were pursued by five timber wolves who kept within a few feet of the sleigh for about three miles of a lonely trail through a tamarac swamp. One of the occupants of the sleigh had a loaded rifle but was persuaded not to use it until absolutely necessary. The team, scenting the wild beasts, galloped at a terrific rate over the frozen trail and the driver was utterly powerless to check their speed. Twice when the horses slowed down in crossing deep snow drifts the leading wolf made several attempts to jump into the sleigh but received a few hard knocks of the rifle stock which sent him reeling backwards on the snow. 

BRULE ROUTE MAY BE USED

Correspondent of Sun States
Railway Will be Built
That Way

A special despatch to the Vancouver Sun by Genevieve Lipsell Skinner, their special correspondent at Ottawa states as follows:

While Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, has indicated that he will not be in a position until next week to announce the route recommended by Presidents E. W. Beatty and Sir Henry Thornton for the Peace River rail outlet, it is freely predicted by those who know the situation that the modified Brule Lake route will be the choice.

That Sir Henry Thornton looked with favor on the Brule proposal may be assumed from the fact that Premier Oliver stated the president of National Railways had explained it fully to him, while attending Peace River conference here in January.

Proposed Route

The modified Brule route follows the Athabasca Valley in a northerly direction from Obed station on main line of the Canadian National to a point where the Athabasca turns east. Proposed line then continues north, dropping into the valley of Little Smokey which it follows until it picks up the old Canadian Northern location from Edmonton and Whitecourt through the heart of the Grande Prairie district and on to Pouce Coupe.

From Junction Point on Sturgeon Lake a 65-mile branch in a northeasterly direction is proposed to connect the present Edmonton—Dunvegan road at a point about 20 miles south of MacLennan, giving direct connection over the existing line to the North Peace River area.

This would mean 140 miles of new construction from Obed to the boundary of the Peace River farming area at Sturgeon Lake as compared with 300 miles from Fort George through the Rocky Mountains to the west boundary at Pouce Coupe.

New Construction

The latter would only solve the problem for the South Peace River area.

North Peace River country would be served by 65 miles of new construction under the Brule proposal, but this would require at least 218 miles additional mileage from Hudson's Hope to the present terminus at West Berwyn, if alternative via Fort George or Vanderhoof should be adopted.

The fact that the Brule line would lie wholly east of the mountains and require less than half the mileage of new construction, is presumed to have weighed heavily with the railway engineers whose opinion was evidently reflected by President Thornton.

NEW LODGE NORTH OF VANDERHOOF WILL BE OPENED THIS SEASON

EDMONTON, Mar. 17.—Announcement is made by Canadian National officials that the new tourist lodge to be opened this summer at Stuart Lake, north of Vanderhoof, to be known as Douglas Lodge, is to be erected by a member of a Vancouver contracting firm who is planning to spend \$35,000 on the central building and log bungalow this year.

In view of this development, the British Columbia government has announced that its 1925 road program will make provision for a motor highway from Vanderhoof to Douglas Lodge.

The lodge is being erected on the site of the old Fort St. James built by the Hudson's Bay Company on the south end of the Stuart Lake in 1806, which was for many years the centre of the fur trade industry in that district. Stuart Lake is noted for its fishing possibilities, trout up to 25 inches in length having been caught there.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumping.

HOMESTEAD LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, conditional upon a dwelling being erected on the first year title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the ranges administered by the Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers up to ten head.
