



ZIONISTS HOLD BIG CONVENTION

More Than Five Hundred Delegates to Gather at Washington Tomorrow

WASHINGTON, June 27.—More than 500 delegates from all parts of the United States will attend the 28th Annual convention of the Zionist organization, beginning here tomorrow and continuing through Tuesday, June 30. Immediately after the sessions of the Zionist Organization Hadassah, the women's Zionist organization, will open its 15th annual convention, which will also continue for two days.

The Zionist convention will decide questions of policy with regard to future operation of the British mandate in the Holy Land, upon which American Zionist leaders will make a determined fight at the World Zionist Congress which will be held in Vienna beginning August 18.

In addition to celebrating the advances made in upbuilding Palestine during the past year, as represented in the opening of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus, and the big strides in immigration and colonization, the chief interest in the convention centers about the resolutions to be submitted to the World Congress at Vienna on the Jewish Agency and Great Britain's administration of the country under its League of Nations.
