Applicant.**Independent Owners on Hudson Bay Mountain close to Smithers Have Number of Good Prospects**

Tenth of Series of Articles on Mining in Bulkley Valley, based on Smithers Board of Trade report.

When J. F. Duthie purchased a number of mineral claims on Hudson Bay Mountain and caused a sensational flurry in the mining industry of this district, which was later destined to collapse suddenly owing to the sudden shutdown of the Federal Company, he did not secure all the good prospects. Some of the properties were not desired and others could not be secured. Among the latter was the Victory Mine.

Victory Mine

Adjoining the Mamie on the north is the Victory Group, owned by Donald G. Simpson. This hard-working prospector has single-handed developed his mine throughout the past eighteen years. In all, ten mineralized veins have been discovered in different parts of the six claims comprising the group. The strike of most of them is nearly directly up and down the mountain side. Silver and lead values predominate, but gold and zinc are also frequent. Beside open cuts and stripping, tunnels have been driven on three of the leads, though most of the work has been put on No. 1 vein on the Victory claim.

Mr. Simpson is an ultra-canny Scot who has rejected a number of very tempting offers for his property.

Coronado

The Coronado Group of crown-granted claims, controlled by R. J. McDonnell of Stewart, was idle throughout 1924. This is a silver-lead property close to the Henderson, from which some high-grade ore was shipped several years ago.

King Tut

South of the Duthie Mines, and adjoining them, is the King Tut Group, located by Milligan Brothers in 1923. During 1924 the owners carried on an aggressive program of development until stopped by lack of further finances.

The main showing is of silver-lead ore in a vein three to five feet in width. A forty-five foot shaft opens up an ore-body assaying across six inches \$200 per ton, all values, and mineralization appears across the remainder of the lead. The vein is proven for a length of 1,000 feet by open cuts, this shaft, and a short drift tunnel, though ore is not encountered at all points where work has been done.

Humming Bird

George Charlton carried on some development last summer for himself and co-owners on the Humming Bird Group, two claims adjoining the upper end of the Henderson. The main showing is in a vein which the owners claim to be a continuation of the Henderson lead. This is shown up on the surface by several open cuts and ore assayings \$50 to \$60 per ton in silver and lead has been found. Development has not proceeded very far as yet.

Other Claims

Other claims on this part of Hudson Bay Mountain on which the owners did small scale development work in 1924 include:

The Amiens' Group (four claims) of R. L. Gale. A vein established for 4000 feet on the surface by open cuts and developed by a short tunnel shows at one point a body of fourteen inches of ore.

John Watt's claims near the Victory Mine. Mr. Watt is a careful prospector who has been developing a group of claims for the past two years with encouraging results.

Pacific Group of two claims, owned by Holbrook and Howatt. These adjoin the Henderson on its lower end and may have something of value on them. Not much work has yet been done, though the claims have now been located for sixteen years.

Alice Group of Alex. S. Miller and associates. Short tunnels have been driven on the vein but values are not yet proven.

Groundhog Group of three claims, owned by Alex. S. Miller and partners. There is a prospecting showing on these.

Peter Nielsen's claims located by himself and partners in 1923. Mr. Nielsen is a hard-working and determined prospector who is doing a lot of work to prove up his property.

All of these have been greatly handicapped by lack of finances for development, each having to rely on his own very limited resources. With more work done some of these may show surprisingly good values. Silver and lead are the chief minerals of value found in most of them.

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ODD NAMES IN POSTAL GUIDE

Colorful Collection with Saints, Indian Places and Noted Men Featured

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—The names of Canadian post offices given in the annual Postal Guide make up an interesting and colorful collection of words. The most ancient cities of the Orient and many of the famous Biblical cities have their counterparts in Canada and are listed in the Postal Guide. There are 630 Canadian post offices bearing the names of "Saint," ranging from the cities of St. John, N.B. and Saul Ste. Marie, to the tiny crossroads stations of rural Quebec.

Authors and poets claim many nominal honors in Canada. Here are some of the names of the places bearing the names of writers: Kipling, Ontario; Kinglake, Ontario; Byron Island, Quebec; Browning, Saskatchewan; Ruskin, B.C.; Dickens, Ontario; Bronte, Ontario; Shakespeare, Ontario; Morley, Alberta; Tolstoi, Manitoba; Milton Heights, Ontario; and Scott, Dumas and Drinkwater, all in Saskatchewan. The names of Canadian writers are used for some places, for example: Connor Creek, Alta.; Parker, Ontario; and Lampman, Saskatchewan.

Some of the names from the west have the ring of optimism and aggressiveness, for example, the following communities are to be found in Saskatchewan: Forward, Excelsior, Success, Conquest, Canuck.

Cities of the old world with counterparts in Canada are Khartum, Ont., Khued, Sask.; Cairo, Ont.; Troy, Ont.; Alexandria, B.C.; Bethesda, Ont.; Athens, Ont.; Beulah, N.B.; and Bible Hill, N.S.

Some of the unusual names are: Temperance Vale, N.B.; Temperance Ville, Ont.; Spuzzum, Fraser Valley, B.C.; Skookumchuck, B.C.; Sea Dog Cove, N.B.; Penzance, Sask.; Eureka, N.S.; Economy, N.S.; Gang Ranch, Cariho; Nightingale, Alla; Cinema, B.C.; Half Moon Bay, B.C.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle not only writes nowadays, but he sells them. Sir Arthur has opened a bookshop across the street from Westminster Abbey and has taken over active management of the stock, which consists entirely of psychic literature. Not even the "Sherlock Holmes" best sellers will be stocked.
