**STYLES OF CENTURIES
AGO ARE FOLLOWED IN
LATEST WOMEN'S HATS**

LONDON, Jan. 21. — "Pikeman's
pot" styles in women's hats, de-
signed after the steel helmets of
the 17th century pikemen, repre-
sented in the collection of arms
and armor of the Tower of Lon-
don, are the latest sensation in
fashionable London millinery.

For some time, milliners have
been hunting for designs that would
by their novelty of appeal, lure
women away from the popular
cloche fashion. Earlier in the
season they thought that a suc-
cessful rival had been found in
the square-crowned hat, but this
was voted down by fastidious
clients.

Now the 17th century helmet
is being used as a model for the
mid-winter hat. The feather-
weight felt of the season—steel
grey is the favorite color choice
for realistic effect—is blocked to
the 17th century outline and a
tuft of feathers gives the femi-
nine touch.

**TAX BACHELORS
AND CHILDLESS**

France Makes Those Who Have
No Children Pay For Those
Who Have

PARIS, Jan. 21. — Bachelors
and childless couples are to be
still more heavily taxed for the
benefit of large families under
the terms of a bill introduced in
the chamber of deputies and
backed by members belonging
to almost all the parliamentary
groups.

The bill proposes to raise the
monthly allowance to parents
with large families from 90
francs as provided by the law
passed in July, 1923, to 360
francs.

To provide the necessary
funds the incomes of bachelors of
both sexes would be taxed on a
sliding scale, the levy amount-
ing to two per cent on incomes
from 7,000 to 10,000 francs,
four per cent on those from
10,000 to 20,000, and six per
cent on those exceeding 20,000.

Married persons without chil-
dren would get off more lightly,
being asked to pay only two per
cent on incomes from 10,000 to
20,000 and four per cent on in-
comes over the latter amount.

This tax is applied over and
above the ordinary income tax.

**BOY BABIES HAVE
NOT STRENGTH OF
GIRLS IS SHOWN**

CHICAGO, Jan. 21. — Boy
babies have not the same chance
of living as girl babies, they are
the weaker sex, according to
Prof. S. J. Holmes, zoologist of
the University of California,
speaking here today before the
American Statistical Association.

"In the first year of life many
more boys die than girls, the
proportion of boy deaths being
greater in the first month and
gradually decreasing through the
rest of the year. Studies made
in places, periods and social
strata where the infant death
rate is low, show the ratio of
boy deaths to girl deaths is
high. As we go back in em-
bryonic life this ratio steadily
increases. The male, apparently,
is the weaker animal at least at
the start of life."
