BANQUET GIVEN AGENT GENERAL

Complimentary Things Said About F. A. Pauline at Dinner in His Honor

SECTIONALISM DEPLORED
 Premier and Minister of Finance Defend Appointment of Former Speaker

VICTORIA, Feb. 3.—"If I am spared for the next few years I am confident that I shall confirm the judgment of the Government in appointing me to this high and honorable post, and then when you come to scan my work you will agree that I have done credit to myself, and the Province of British Columbia," said F. A. Pauline, agent-general for B.C., in a valedictory speech at a complimentary dinner here. Mr. Pauline who will leave for London this week to take up his appointment, was the guest of honor at the dinner tendered to him by the City Council, directors of the Chamber of Commerce and Victoria and Island Publicity Bureau, held at the Chamber of Commerce rooms. The function was attended by a number of representative citizens.

Proud of Representative
 "We are very proud that one of our members should have been chosen to his high post," remarked C. P. W. Schwengers, president of the Victoria Chamber of Commerce, in submitting the toast of the guest of honor. Mr. Pauline has been one of the best and most active members of the chamber. In his personality Mr. Pauline united many talents most desirable for the position he was to occupy. Mr. Schwengers said he regretted the attitude of a portion of the Vancouver press to the appointment, but how could the Government expect to pay much attention to the matter when it was recognized from what quarter it came?

Mayor J. Carl Pendray indicated that the occasion was one in which all classes of the citizens united, because they all wished Mr. Pauline well. He could tell Mr. Pauline the citizens would be only too glad to aid him, while, when the Agent General returned to Victoria he could be assured of the warmest welcome. (Applause.)

to the Vancouver criticism of the appointment. Vancouver wanted not only the Agent Generalship but the white bear. The new Agent-General knew the class of population wanted in B.C., men of industry and character, who would build up the community as it should be.

The Premier
 Premier Oliver remarked that the occasion was eminently fitting for such a gathering to be held. He expressed his surprise at the criticism levelled at the appointment, but said he had arrived at the conclusion that, mainly it was sectionalism, directed unfortunately against Mr. Pauline. The Government could not afford to make mistakes, and of the names of men submitted to the Government for this very important appointment, Mr. Pauline was chosen.

The Government had had a particular opportunity to judge him in the eight years that Mr. Pauline had been a member, in a great many varied circumstances which would test out any man, added Mr. Oliver, in commending the choice.

Mr. Pauline was going to London, the Premier went on, to perform a work eminently to the advantage of the people of B.C. "He has those characteristics which will enable co-operation to bring about the best results. I venture to say that if the public bodies perform their share as well as Mr. Pauline will, then the best results which we can hope will result." It was unfair to hit the Government a crack over the shoulder of Mr. Pauline, he observed, in declaring that politics ought not to have anything to do with such an appointment.

Hon. J. D. McLean, minister of finance also spoke appreciatively of Mr. Pauline.

COMPEL CHILDREN TO ATTEND AT SCHOOLS

NELSON, Feb. 3.—The school board is once more wrestling with the problem of compulsory attendance at schools. Complaints have been made that some pupils are kept at home by their parents without good reason contrary to the School Law. The latter was discussed at some length at a recent meeting of the board but no action taken pending notice being sent to offending parents.

REMOVE ROCK SECOND AVENUE

Prince Rupert Club Eyesore Again to be Taken Up With City Council

At the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Club last night representations were made to the members that the rock beneath the present building was an eyesore and that if possible steps should be taken to have it removed.

After considerable discussion the directors were given power once more to approach the city council to see if some feasible arrangement could be made by which the rock could be removed while the crusher is there. It was felt that while the building suited the members very well, it was not a good thing for the city to have it stand in its present position. The difficulty is, the club has a number of outstanding debentures against its property and the debenture holders have refused to sanction the carrying out of any proposal made so far.

A number of suggestions were made at the meeting and as a result it is expected that some concrete proposal will be made to the city with a view if possible to the improvement of the appearance of the street.

SCHOOLS WILL BE CHARGED ON METER FOR WATER SERVICE

On recommendation of the utilities committee, the city council decided last night to charge water rates to the city schools on the basis of meter consumption instead of the present flat rates. Whereas, a flat rate of \$50 per year was now charged Booth School, on basis of meter consumption, the charge would be \$258. If the meters were not installed, flat charges of \$200, \$175, \$175, and \$30 might be charged Booth, King Edward, Borden Street and Seal Cove schools instead of \$50, \$50, \$50, and \$12 respectively as at present.

Ald. McMorde pointed out that the city would eventually pay the

bills anyway. It was only in fairness to the waterworks department that it should be credited with the amount that was coming to it.

The report was adopted.
