### Queen Mother's Castle Overlooks Scapa Flow

LONDON (CP)—Queen Mother Elizabeth's purchase of Barrogil Castle, Caithness, has pleased crofters in the extreme north of Scotland. They are jubilant that the old castle on Pentland Firth has once again come into possession of a Scot—and a royal Scot at that.

For centuries it was the ancestral home of the Earls of Caithness, the last of whom died about 60 years ago. He is still known in the district as "the young earl." Following his death, the castle was bequeathed to an English friend.

Commanding an imposing view of Pentland Firth, almost opposite Scapa Flow, Barrogil Castle, a 16th-century building, was occupied by the army during the Second World War. When the roof is repaired, architects say it will be snug.

It has turrets and battlements and its history is as tempestuous as the lives of the Earls of Caithness. Queen Elizabeth first glimpsed Barrogil Castle in June. It was her first visit to Caithness.

A writer in the Glasgow Herald said: "The castle's loneliness, its splendor, the fine salt Pentland air always blowing about it—which of these was it that attracted her? Or was she impressed by the lovely surrounding country... heathery... high with a dress circle view of Scapa Flow, or was it superb Dunnet Head that took her fancy?"

The inside of the castle is attractive, too. The dungeon has been converted into a wine cellar. There are high- vaulted stone passages and steep, winding stairs. The first floor drawing room has great windows that look out to sea and there is a cosy little library. The main bedroom is in a tower.

Outside are old walled gardens with apple blossom in season. In the spring there is a wealth of daffodils. ### British Plan Elimination Of Airports

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (CP)—Britain hopes to launch her airliners of the future from catapults and land them on their bellies, on sheets of taut wire.

The British Association for the Advancement of Science was told today of experiments with this apparatus, designed to free civil aviation from the mounting cost of big airports.

The experiments are going on at the Royal Aircraft Establishment in Farnborough, the government's chief aviation research centre.

Sir Ben Lockspeiser, a leading scientific adviser, told the association the apparatus has been used successfully for fighter planes.

Every time airliners get bigger and faster, Lockspeiser said, concrete runways have to be lengthened and further reinforced—and the point has been reached where airports are an "expensive nuisance."

"If aircraft are to become faster and heavier, the main economic problems in aeronautics are, in my view, less in the air than on the ground," he said.

He suggested that, instead of using a runway for taking off, even a big plane could be catapulted into the air.

For landing, the plane is flown level a few feet from the ground, caught on a hook by arrester gear and dropped on the taut sheet, which allows a good landing without a bounce.

Lockspeiser said air liners using such a method would require some reinforcement of the fuselage but this would be small in comparison with the weight of present undercarriage gear.

The landing rigging was reported based on apparatus long used on aircraft carriers with "radical, indeed revolutionary, modifications."

### Bigger Planes Used For Northern Work

EDMONTON (CP)—The RCAF is switching to bigger planes to do its northern transport work out of Edmonton.

The first of the "flying boxcars" which will ultimately be used exclusively have been delivered to the Edmonton-based 435 Transport Squadron. They are Fairchild planes and are known as C-119s. Until the Fairchild's arrived, the 435 Squadron had been using Dakotas.

The new transports are unwieldy in appearance but they can carry 10 to 12 tons, about five times as much as a Dakota. Their range is 2000 miles compared to a Dakota's 1500. A Fairchild can do 220 miles an hour, 80 faster than a Dakota.

The "boxcars" can load individual items up to the size of a 2 1/2-ton truck or a medium-sized tank. Used as a troop carrier, it can accommodate 62 soldiers with equipment. Used as an ambulance, it can carry 35 litters.
