NEW YORK (AP)—Republican Senator William Langer of North Dakota described President Truman yesterday as a great statesman who "couldn't be bribed, couldn't be bought and couldn't be bull-dozed."

In a speech before the National Association of Letter Carriers, Langer said:

"In the Senate, I have seen things that have made me very proud of Harry Truman. . . . He led the fight for the common people of the United States as only a great statesman could lead it."

Japan Papers Leave Agency

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's three leading newspapers, with a combined circulation of more than 16,000,000, today announced they are withdrawing their support from Kyodo, the country's dominant news agency.

Asahi, Mainichi and Yomiuri in a joint action withdrew their support of the agency which replaced Domei at the end of the Second World War.

Kenichiro Shinobu, managing editor and director of Asahi, said officials of the three big dailies felt they had not had proper representation on Kyodo's board of directors.

Hostess Revisits Pioneer Road House

SPRINGFIELD, N.S. (CP)—Roadhouses have come a long way since weary travellers in the early 1800s used to stop for food and lodging at "Half-Way House" on the now forgotten road between Albany Cross in Annapolis county and Liverpool, on the south shore.

The inn was established by Nova Scotia's lieutenant-governor strictly on a non-profit basis. Footsore travellers could pay for their bed and board or not—depending on their pocket books. It was a haven for farmers who used the 40-mile rugged, forest road to drive their cattle to market at Liverpool.

A recent visitor to the now abandoned roadhouse was 93-year-old Mrs. William Acker, a one-time hostess there. For many years she made a home for her daughters and five sons in the isolated spot.

She was remunerated by the provincial government for the expenses incurred in sheltering and feeding travellers.

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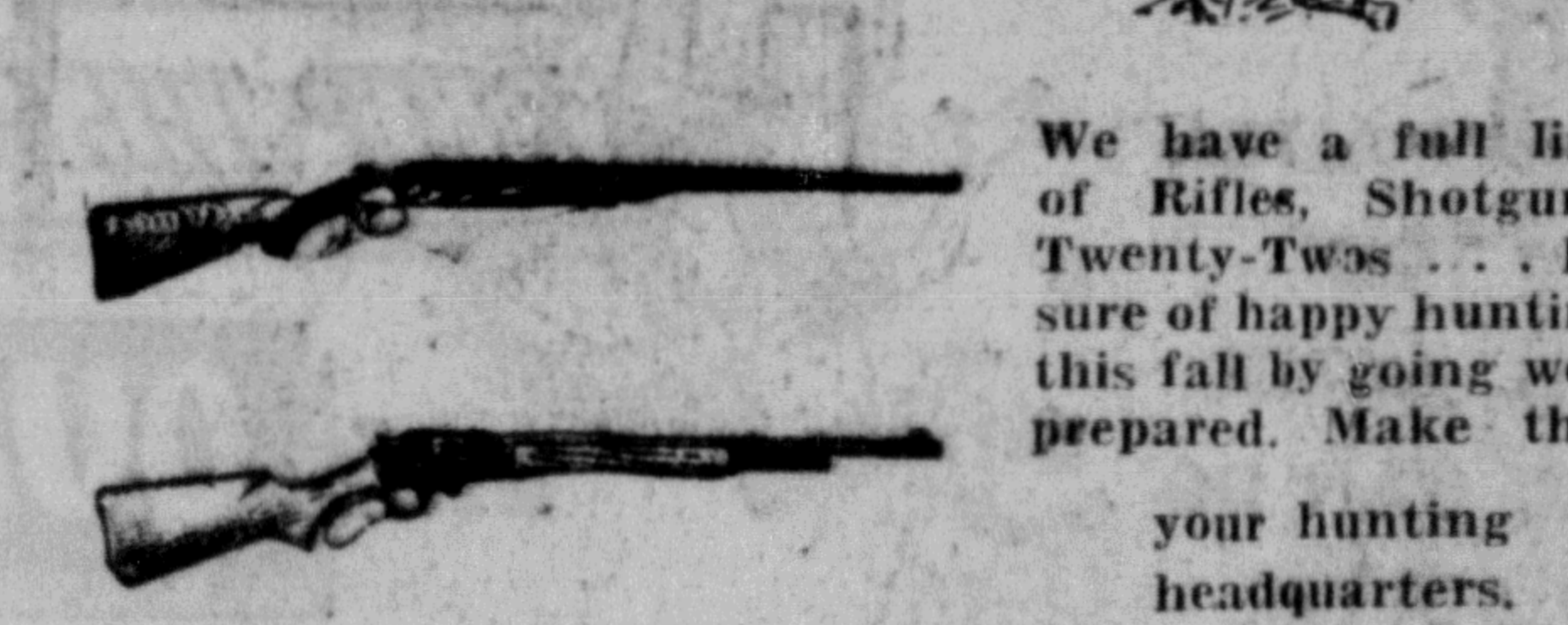
