U.S. EMPLOYERS STOP LIQUOR

Prohibits its Use by Any of Their Employees

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—It is the observation of Prohibition Commissioner Haynes that public opinion, expressing itself through various channels ranging from great industrial corporations to the theatre, is making easier the enforcement of the prohibition law. The addition of the name of the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company to those of other concerns which have forbidden their employes the use of intoxicants, has just been recorded at enforcement headquarters. Scores of employes, Mr. Haynes says, have posted notices in their establishments that users of liquor will be automatically dismissed.

bootleggers and their customers. We class as bootleggers all those who manufacture, sell or distribute intoxicants either personally or through agents or members of their families. Such persons will be discharged on evidence satisfactory to the management without waiting for conviction in the courts."

The management held that a miner under the influence of liquor was a dangerous element because of the many chances for disaster underground through carelessness.

An even more drastic rule was recently laid down by Henry Ford, and numbers of hotels and restaurants have acted to banish liquors from their premises. One hotel, Mr. Haynes says, forced its employes to sign a pledge to not sell liquor and as an added precaution employed detectives to search the waiters when they appeared for duty.

No Prohibition Jokes

Some theatres have banned jokes on prohibition from their stages, and one insurance company is asking applicants whether they drink bootleg liquor. Mr. Haynes declares, "A western city advised its employes that use of liquor would result in dismissal, and caused each worker to give his signature as evidence that he had been warned."

Intemperance was never wise, economical or safe, in the opinion of Commissioner Haynes, but it is infinitely less so now than ever. "Amid the powerful inventions and hurried life of today sound bodies, steady nerves and sober judgment are indispensable to life. This fact is recognized everywhere."

IS OPPOSED TO HIGH TARIFFS

President of Saskatchewan Grain Growers Talks of Separation From East

(By Canadian Press)
REGINA, Sask., Jan. 30.—Directing a thunderous broadside against the tariff policy of the Dominion government, George F. Edwards, in his presidential address before the annual convention of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association here declared that continuance of such an un-national and short-sighted policy would inevitably lead to a definite break between Eastern and Western Canada.

He further castigated the federal government for not giving greater attention to the problems of the farmer. The unfavorable conditions of the basic industry of the country, he maintained, was well known to the government and all business interests in Canada, but a spirit of apathy and indifference seemed to be a more preferable course for these interests to follow.

"We in the West, believe that we have never been fairly treated by the governments of Canada, irrespective of party, with respect to the fiscal policy of the country during the past 40 years," Mr. Edwards said. The protective tariff he characterized as "one of those hampering disabilities," which had been raised particularly to foster manufacturing interests, without giving thought to the consequent hardships brought upon the agricultural industry.

No Compensation

"There never has been and apparently never will be, any advantage that will accrue to the Western country to compensate for the increased price they have to pay for all their

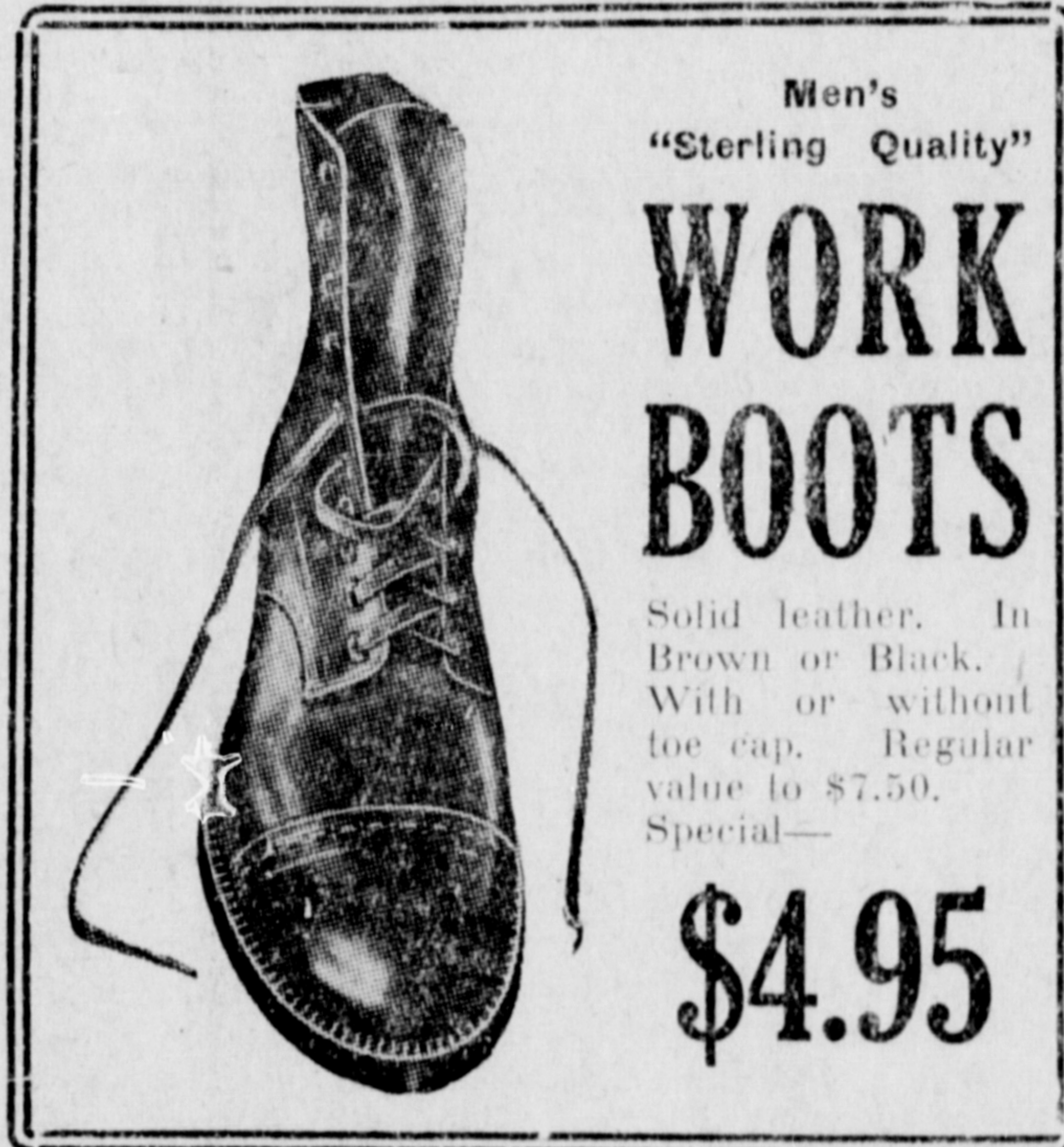
