

Concert Tour Brings Famed Music Artists

First three artists to appear here on the inauguration of the 1952-53 season of Alaska Music Trail Sept. 24, are Bea Urban, violinist, Luigi Silva, cellist and Maxim Schapiro, pianist. Both Silva and Schapiro have performed in this city before on the Trail, the cellist making an appearance two years ago, while Schapiro has been on both preceding Alaska Music Trail tours. Born in Budapest, Hungary, young Urban has inherited the great national talent attributed to so many of the violin virtuosos of today. Hailed as "astonishingly gifted," he studied under the guidance of the great master, Ysaye, in Belgium, developing the superb technique and colorful interpretation which have won him the plaudits of world-wide audiences.

He served in the U.S. Army as soldier-musician, playing under Andre Kostelanetz and with the Army Air Force orchestra. Luigi Silva, often called "the Paganini of the cello," already has many friends in Alaska and in Prince Rupert. He ranks with Casals and Piatigorsky as one of the few rarely gifted cellists of our time.

Maxim Schapiro at the piano assures a remarkable concert by this trio. Other artists to come are Grete Menzel, beautiful lyric soprano, prima donna of the Vienna, Havana and New York City Centre Opera Companies.

Next, in March, Pierre Sancan, famous French pianist, chosen as the first French artist to come to America on a cultural exchange basis in 1951. He was awarded the coveted Grand Prix de Rome for his compositions and as a pianist.

For the fourth concert, requested by so many members of the AT, the new vocal sensation, Raymond Manton, tenor, will be presented in April.

At his debut in San Francisco's huge auditorium, 8,000 people stood and cheered this young singer. He has been heard on Standard Hour with Yehudi Menuhin and also on the Standard television concert hour.

Spareribs Provide Tasty Dish For Barbeques

An attractive garden can be used to good advantage when crisp fall evenings make a barbecue supper an ideal way to entertain.

Steaks naturally are on the preferred list with the barbecue crowd, but there are other equally acceptable meats and dishes such as chicken salad.

Barbecued spareribs are recommended as a family favorite by the consumer section of the Federal Agriculture Department.

The butcher should be asked to cut the spareribs into serving-size pieces, about three inches in length with approximately three ribs to each serving. Allow at least two pounds for three to four persons.

For indoor preparation the spareribs should first be browned for 2 minutes, uncovered, in an oven of 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Covered with a favorite barbecue sauce, they should be cooked, covered, 30 minutes longer.

The pan then is uncovered and the spareribs cooked 20 minutes longer or until they are crisp and brown.

The home economists recommend this recipe for barbecue sauce which gives the spareribs a rich, red color:

Ingredients: Two cups canned tomatoes, one tablespoon spicy meat sauce, one-half teaspoon chili powder, one teaspoon dry mustard, two tablespoons brown sugar, two tablespoons vinegar, one-quarter cup chopped onion, salt and pepper to taste. Combine all ingredients and mix thoroughly. This is enough sauce for two pounds of spareribs.

CONSUMER COMPLAINTS

The Canadian Association of Consumers is campaigning among its 13,000 individual members to discourage retailers from giving coupons and premiums with their merchandise.

In a recent statement the C.A.C. says that many Canadian manufacturers seem to think "they can still use the old barter

system of offering women a string of bright beads in exchange for a nice bundle of soap flakes or a coke mix on a grocery shelf and dresses it up with a 'free' tea-towel or a pretty plastic scoop he is enticing her to part with more of her precious dollars than she may need to do," says the C.A.C. "Since inflationary conditions have made the lot of every consumer more difficult, the Canadian Association of Consumers has maintained that one way to reduce costs to the buyer would be for manufacturers to curtail their costly advertising method of giving coupons and premiums with their merchandise."

50 Boys Needed to Form First Air Cadet Squadron

Formation of a squadron of the Air Cadet League of Canada is to be formed in Prince Rupert in the near future.

A committee headed by Jack Laurie and F. E. Anfield who will take applications of 50 or more boys necessary to form the squadron, was appointed by Commanding Officer Flight-Lieut. R. H. Garrett.

J. Taylor, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, was chairman of the meeting, attended by 13 members.

Flt/Lt. Garrett joined the RCAF in 1940 as an AC2, served as a pilot in Nova Scotia and Newfoundland on Coastal Command and in England on Bomber Command. A graduate of the Royal Military College at Kingston, he is now an engineer at the Columbia Cellulose plant at Port Edward.

The CO stressed that the citizens of Prince Rupert must get behind the Air Cadet League. Boys between the ages of 14 and 18 are eligible whether in school or not. For those not attending school, enquiries should be made to Murray Johnston at the QCA offices, Third Avenue.

The Air Cadet League of Canada is not a military organization. The purpose of the league is to train young men in the basic principles of good citizenship, said Flt/Lt. Garrett.
