ONLY ATHLETES SAFE IN ROME

Streets Crowded, Very Narrow Sidewalks and Taxis Drive Fast

ROME, May 7.—The municipality of Rome has begun a series of innovations in street traffic regulation which, many Holy Year visitors to the Italian capital hope, will have the effect of lessening the dangers presented to the co-existence in Rome of perhaps the most reckless motor car drivers in the world and the narrowest sidewalks of any of the great capitals.

Safety first in New York, London and Paris is largely an admonition to avoid jay-walking, and the careful pedestrian is safe if he follows the rules of the road and trusts to the traffic policeman. Here, however, the only sure way lies in ducking into a hallway during a particularly busy movement of traffic.

Many of the most important squares and thoroughfares of Rome have merely nominal sidewalks for pedestrians or none at all. For most of the length of the Corso Umberto, the city's busiest artery of traffic, no more than two or three people can walk abreast on the sidewalk, while the Via Condotti, Rome's Bond Street, is about 30 feet wide, including the two narrow sidewalks. The Piazza di Spagna, the city's tourist center, has no sidewalk at all and is a mad helter-skelter of traffic.

Despite the narrowness of the streets Rome's taxicabs, and they are by far the most luxurious and fastest in the world, dash along at a breakneck speed, the chauffeurs sounding their old-fashioned horns every few seconds to terrify the pedestrians who are unable to crowd onto the sidewalks.

EXODUS TO UNITED STATES DECLINING

(Toronto Globe)

The statistics published by the United States authorities show a gratifying reduction in the migration of Canadians to the United States. Up to June, 1924, and inclusive of that month, there was an increase. Since that time there has been a decline, as shown by the following table:

The improvement continued during the present year. In January, 1925, there were 9,159, as compared with 15,513 in January, 1924, and in February, 1925, 5,680, as compared with 13,993 in February, 1924. Should this improvement be maintained, the migration for 1925 will be little more than half that of 1924.

CASSIAR LIKELY TO BE A NEW KLONDYKE

(Edmonton Journal)

The prediction is being made that a new Klondyke will shortly be uncovered in the Cassiar country in northern British Columbia, just south of the border of the Yukon. The ice in the Stikine usually goes out about the first of May and a large number of prospectors have been waiting in Wrangell, Alaska, for this in order to go in and try their luck. While their route involves the shortest overland journey, the field is tributary to the Mackenzie river system. The spot where the finds were made, that are responsible for the present excitement, is thirty miles northeast of Dease lake, from which the Dease river flows into the Liard, which joins the Mackenzie.
