VOLUNTEERS TO BE TRAINED BY PETTY OFFICER

G. H. Kinch Permanently Appointed Here for Position of Instructor

With the arrival of Chief Petty Officer G. H. Kinch from the Esquimalt naval training station the work of the local naval volunteers will be immediately got under way from a practical standpoint. Chief Petty Officer Kinch, who has been permanently appointed by the Ottawa government to give naval training to the 52 ratings to be voluntarily enlisted in Prince Rupert, has had twenty-nine years experience in the Royal Navy and Royal Canadian Navy and will be responsible for all future training of recruits prior to their leaving for more advanced instruction at the Esquimalt naval barracks. In addition to giving instruction this Chief Petty Officer will be in charge of recruiting.

Recruits will be signed on for a three year term under the existing naval volunteer scheme, and after course in preliminary training locally in seamanship, rope splicing and other branches of naval knowledge, they will undergo additional and more advanced training at the Royal Canadian naval barracks at Esquimalt. The training periods at Esquimalt have been set down for May 1 to 16; June 15 to 27; Sept. 21 to Oct. 3; and Oct. 5 to 17.

Upon enlistment, and at the conclusion of preliminary training, all recruits will be in receipt of pay from the time they leave the local company headquarters until they return first class transportation being furnished at government expense.

Physical Training

A feature of the training will be that of physical culture. Upon the enrollment of 25 men in the volunteer reserve the government will furnish gymnastic equipment consisting of vaulting horse, parallel bars, horizontal bars, Indian clubs, etc. Chief Petty Officer Kinch is particularly well qualified in this branch of instruction, he being a former heavyweight champion of the Mediterranean fleet and an expert in the art of Jiu-Jitsu.

Gunnery Training

A twelve pounder, 12 cwt. naval gun, mounted on a regular ship's mounting, is already at the local naval headquarters, and will be used for gunnery instruction. Rifles and the necessary leather accoutrements are already here.

The local headquarters of the Royal Canadian Volunteer Reserve detachment have been established in the Hays Building and Chief Petty Officer Kinch will attend daily to receive enlistments and to give full particulars of the many advantages of this branch of His Majesty's service.
