aside from any other expense would cost \$600 to negotiate the round trip from Wrangell to Boundary to Dease Lake and return. The Douglas type of earner would be able to carry but two passengers, a pilot and very few pounds of freight, so that almost exorbitant rates would have to be charged to make any profit in such a venture.

Low Cost Machines

Backers of the proposed service, however, assert that the HS-2L plane now used with great success by the Aero-Marine Corporation on the Miami-Key West-Cajama run is ideal for the purpose. The HS-2L plane is equipped with two 450-horse-power Liberty motors and has a wing spread of 96 feet. The plane will carry 12 passengers and a pilot with ease and cost less than half the amount required for the Douglas air cruiser and is considered admirably fitted for the proposed service. This plane has high speed, economy of operation, carrying capacity and most important for such a run exceptional maneuvering ability in its favor. The climb from Wrangell to Dease Lake over the Coast mountains is said to be greater than 2,000 feet and any plane to successfully negotiate such service must be capable of sustained climbing ability.

both the Grande Prairie district and the coal fields, could not be called direct on any possible route and would have prohibitive grades as a wheat line. If a route is adopted to cut out the excessive length and prohibitive grades, it will render the line useless as a means of getting out the coal.

The opinion prevails here that when there is sufficient demand for coal to justify opening up the Hoppe coal fields, it will be more economical to construct a branch line from the G.N.R. main line into those fields. Any line by which it could be attempted to connect Grande Prairie with the main line at Brule must take a route from Grande Prairie, which would just touch good land suitable for settlement and immediately turn away from it again into the foothills.

Little Smoky

A line up the Little Smoky and Iosegun rivers and down Pine Creek to the Athabasca, connecting at Whitecourt, would be entirely through good country suitable for settlement. From that a short cut off to the main line near Edson, passing through the Mahaska, Shining Bank, and McLeod valley districts, already partially settled by people who went in there on a distinct promise of a railway down McLeod Valley, would involve less cost of construction than any other route hitherto suggested.

This would serve Grande Prairie, and by co-operation between the C.P.R. and G.N.R., the whole of the Peace River district as a western outlet. It would at the same time afford relief to other districts scarcely less in need of railway service than the Peace River district, and would by tempting settlement, become a profitable line throughout, instead of involving a long, expensive haul through vacant and not very habitable territory.
