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RED AGITATORS SHOULD SHRIVEL

Diatribes Against Them in Edmonton Paper Using Picturesque Language

MRS. SNOWDEN'S MISSION Says British Labor Party Tries to Dissociate Itself From Crimes of Soviet

A scathing diatribe on Red agitators and their aims and on the evils of the Soviet arising out of the visit of Mrs. Phillip Snowden appears in a recent issue of the Edmonton Bulletin which says: The British Labor party is busily engaged in dissociating itself from Lenin and Trotsky and all their crimes, theories and revolutionary activities. What-over may have been the failures of Mr. Ramsay MacDonald and his associates, they know why the British electors turned them out of office. And they understand equally well that to get back they must first cut themselves clear of the suspicion that they aim to set up a state of communistic disorder in Britain.

Different Ideals That perhaps explains why Mrs. Phillip Snowden is touring Canada and making anti-communistic speeches. Alike the circumstances and the subject matter of her addresses are proof that it is considered important by those for whom she speaks to differentiate between the ideals of British labor and the policies of the destroyers of Russia. There may be doubts that the Soviet leopard has of late changed his spots so completely as she supposes. There is no room for doubt as to her desire to draw a sharp line of demarcation between the intentions of the Labor leaders in Britain and the suicidal tyranny of the twin geniuses of the Russian horror.

A large measure of public service may be done to Canada if the speeches of Mrs. Snowden are taken to heart by those to whom state socialism "as they have it in Russia" has been proclaimed as the gospel of economic salvation. As to conditions in Russia when the policies of Lenin and Trotsky had attained their fatal success, she speaks with first hand knowledge. That Lenin realized the collapse of his communistic dream, and turned again to capitalism as the one and only way of re-establishing Russia and perpetuating his regime, has long been known to all who would believe what reputable observers told them, and is confirmed by Mrs. Snowden in a way that should convince those whose radical sympathies made them skeptical of the testimony of other witnesses.

Earthly Paradise Red agitators have been running at large in Canada, without much interference either of law or public opinion, preaching communism as the short and simple solution of every social ill, the one thing needed to transform Canada into the earthly paradise Lenin had established in Russia. Whoever challenged the heavenly conditions supposed to be prevailing in the realm of the Soviet was condemned as an enemy of the man who had to work for a living; a hireling whose aim was to keep the proletariat in subjection to the bourgeoisie; or a reactionary who would not see the dawn of a new social condition when none should be over-worked or under-fed and all should have leisure to cultivate

the finer things in life. Mrs. Snowden will not convert these mischief-makers. Some of them, there is reason to suspect, have been drawing pay from Moscow. All of them should have been if they were not, for they were promoting the world revolution Lenin aspired to bring about. But it can be hoped that her presentation of the essential facts will go home to the mass of those upon whose credulity these agents of destruction have been preying, and will leave them without followers. Communism brought Russia to a pass where working people were placed under task-masters, dragooned by red soldiers, and fed upon bread made of mud. That is the illuminating fact that ought to arise in the minds of his hearers when next one of these irresponsible blatherskites mounts a soap box and begins to depict the glories of communistic rule.

CHINESE SHOW WAS NOVEL ENTERTAINMENT

Affair Was Staged Last Night For Benefit of General Hospital

The Chinese entertainment put on in the Empress Theatre last night by the Pyne Min (Chinese) Association in aid of the General Hospital was only fairly well attended.

The first half of the novel entertainment took the form of a play entitled "Time Forbids," which was spoken entirely in the Chinese language. The play was well acted judging from the serious manner in which the Oriental actors took their respective parts. The military uniforms and stage settings were very pretty and reflected credit upon the organizers of the entertainment.

The play, a five act one, dealt with the despotic rule of Yuan Sai Kai who commissions Gen. Jung Nee Sing to hold a conference at Shanghai to prevent any failure in his policy of the year 1915. The opposing party, detecting Yuan's intention, laid plans to oppose him. Gen. Jung Nee Sing arrives at Shanghai with his two wives, the ladies causing a good deal of laughter with their quarrelling. The general's wife, Yet Gue, whom he had married by force, proved herself a very difficult lady to handle. Yet Gue eventually escapes from her associates and gets assistance in her revenge. In the last act Gen. Sing met his death at the hands of Yut Gue's former husband.

The Pyne Min orchestra played Oriental music during the entertainment, which to say the least was far removed from jazz. Miss Ruby Lee Maahs played two pianoforte solos during the intermission.

Second Half The second half of the entertainment dealt with events of the 12th Century in China's history and consisted of some clever sword fighting and other Chinese acting.
