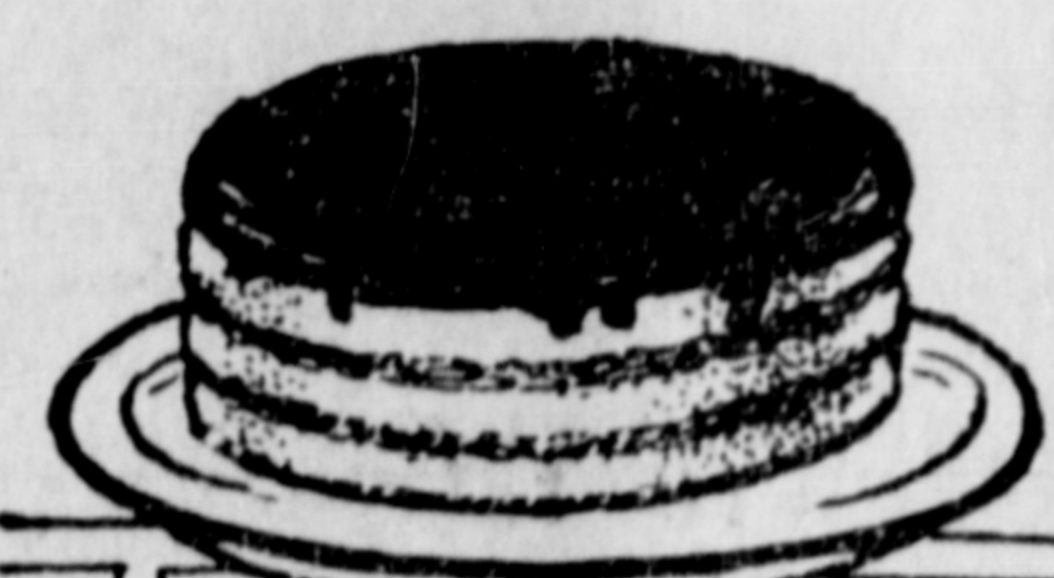

### FLOYD COLLINS IS FOOT FREE IN CAVE

Now Walled in Behind Rock But Efforts Being Made to Release Him

CAVE CITY, Feb. 5.—A slide in a sand cave yesterday left Floyd Collins foot free for the first time since he was imprisoned on Friday morning when a boulder wedged his legs where rescuers were unable to reach them.

Collins is now walled in behind a rock, which fell from the side of the cave. He has held on cheerfully while rescuers worked without cessation to effect his release.

### Appointed Director Canadian Pacific



The recent election of Mr. Ross Huntington McMaster to be a director of the Canadian Pacific, filling the vacancy created on the board by the death of the late Lord Shaughnessy, is a recognition of the Company's part of his long-proved ability. DAUPHIN, Man., Feb. 5.—Possibly Alsa Thompson, aged 7, on trial at Los Angeles today for sanity, following "confessions" of several attempts to poison, did give the twin sisters ground glass before they died here, apparently from pneumonia, two years ago, according to the physician who attended the children.
