**MILLER IS AT
SWANSON BAY**

C.G.M.M. Vessel Arrives at Mill
Town To Load One Million
Feet for Atlantic.

G. G. M. M. Steamer Canadian
Miller, Capt. Doulton, was off
Rachel Island at 8:30 this morn-
ing on her way to Swanson Bay,
where she will load one million
feet of lumber for the Atlantic
seaboard. The vessel is in-
bound from the Orient and is
expected to arrive at Swanson
Bay about seven o'clock this
evening.

Capt. John McKernan, G. G.
M. M. coast pilot; W. McKinstry,
supercargo from Vancouver, and
W. J. Nelson, local customs of-
ficer, left here at 2:30 this morn-
ing on the launch Pachena to
pick up the vessel at Triple Is-
land.

The Miller has 140 tons of
Oriental cargo which she will
discharge at Vancouver after
loading at Swanson Bay.

This is the first visit of the
Canadian Miller to this part of

the coast. She was built at
Montreal in 1919 and is similar
in size to the Canadian Scottish.
The vessel has been operated in
the Atlantic service.

Had Rough Trip

The Pachena returned to port
at 10 o'clock this morning bring-
ing in Mr. Nelson, the customs
officer. The Canadian Miller
arrived off Triple Island at 2:30
this morning, but, owing to the
roughness of the seas, it was
impossible for the pilot to get
aboard the vessel. At 8 o'clock
he and the other officers boarded
the Miller at Rachel Island.

Capt. Doulton reported a rough
passage of 22 days across the
Pacific ocean from Miike, a coal-
ing port in north Japan. Other-
wise the voyage was uneventful.
The skipper also reported that
the Rose Spit light was out and
that there was a menace to naviga-
tion in the form of two sunken
logs northeast of Lan-
tara Island.

**SALMON IN LAKE
ONTARIO SUCCEED**

For Six Years Experiments Have
Been Conducted and Fish
Are Now There.

Salmon from the seaboards of
America live and grow fat in the
waters of Lake Ontario and the
streams of British Columbia, ac-
cording to a bulletin issued by
the Canadian department of mar-
ine and fisheries announcing
success of a six-year experiment.
Fully matured sockeyes, native to
the Pacific coast, have been taken
from Lake Ontario this
year and 2-year-old Atlantic salmon
have been caught in the
Pacific coming down the Cawichan
river of Vancouver Island.

An average of 200,000 young
sockeyes have been released in
Lake Ontario each year since
1918, and 500,000 Atlantic salmon
have been planted in the
rivers of British Columbia in the
same period.

Last year's Canadian fisheries
production was estimated at
\$42,565,515, with British Colum-
bia having the most extensive
salmon resources on the continent
accounting for 50 per cent of
the business. Salmon, halibut,
lobster and codfish constitute 69
per cent of the Dominion produc-
tion.

**LONDON NIGHT CLUBS
TO BE SUPERVISED**

Evidence Being Collected By
Scotland Yard Prior To
Legislation Being
Passed.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Proprietors
and habitues of night clubs suf-
fered a jolt when they learned
yesterday that Scotland Yard had
had its eye upon them for weeks.
The police have been gathering
evidence for Home Secretary
Johnston Hicks, who is preparing
a bill giving the police greater
powers of supervision, especially
in preventing the sale of liquor
out of hours.
