The Fair Board's permanent mineral exhibit has been set up in the cabinet provided for it at the Canadian National Railway station by Phil McDonald and George W. Kerr. It is a splendid display which is already attracting a great deal of attention.

The enrolment of pupils at Booth School is 409 or an increase of ten over the month of February. At Borden Street school the number is 292 with several new arrivals to enter within a few days. This was reported at the school board meeting last night. At the High School the total number enrolled is 132.
