So great was the congestion at times that it was almost impossible for a taxi to drive up to an entrance to discharge a fare. He moved that the council be requested to take action. Commissioner Montgomery seconded.

Congestion of cars in Sixth Street between Second and Third Avenues and the promiscuous parking of cars on the streets was also referred to.
