Viscount Milner Dies After Distinguished Career as Statesman

LONDON, May 13 .- Viscount Milner, 71 years of age, a rmer secretary for war in the British government, who had mill for some time from sleeping sickness, died at his resince near Canterbury today.



Shows How Gentleman's Agreement with Japan Unsuccessful in U.S.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., May 13 .- At the session of the the Native Sons of the Golden West today, V. McClatchy, Secretary of the California Joint Immigration Committee, spoke on "Results of the Immigration Act," considering particularly the provision excluding aliens ineligible to itizenship and the course of Japan and her friends in connection herewith.

He quoted Chairman Johnson of the House Immigration Committee to the effect that during the first six months' opera-

tion of the 1924 law only 453 Japanese had been admitted to the country, all of them for temporary sojourn only, while during the year previous, under the Gentlemen's Agreement, 8,481 had been admitted, nearly all for permanent settlement. This fact alone he claimed fully justified enforcement of exclusion as was contemplated by President Roosevelt should the Agreement fail to secure the desired results.
