## British Army Sends Women on Overseas Jobs

LONDON (Reuters)—For the first time in its history the British Army announced today that it is sending women soldiers overseas to serve in the ranks of regular forces.  
 Three officers and 54 enlisted members of the Women's Royal Army Corps will fly to Gibraltar Sept. 30 to form part of a mixed anti-aircraft battery there. They will work as fire-control operators, telephonists, plotters, drivers and clerks. Women have been sent overseas in the past only for non-operational jobs.

## BLACKWOOD on Bridge

 Mr. Muzzy's Error Snarls Defense Against This Bid

Mr. Muzzy made two mistakes in his hand—which is by no means a record for him. Mr. Champion led the eight of clubs and Mr. Muzzy was permitted to win with the queen. He returned a club and again Mr. Muzzy ducked. After winning with the jack, Mr. Champion led back the trey of clubs. Mr. Muzzy discarded the deuce of hearts and Mr. Dale had to win with the ace.

Mr. Dale entered dummy with a heart and returned a diamond. Mr. Muzzy played the seven and the finesse of the queen was successful.

Crossing to dummy again with a heart, Mr. Dale led another diamond. When Mr. Muzzy played the king, he let him hold it. At this point the defense was dead.

Mr. Dale won with the spade return with dummy's king and since two diamonds were split 3-2, he was able to win two more tricks in that suit which, with two spades, three hearts and a club, gave him his game.

Mr. Muzzy had erred in the defense. He now erred again by daring to criticize Mr. Champion. "Without a semblance of an entry in your hand, why didn't you shift to spades after winning the first two club tricks?" he asked.

Mr. Champion did a slow burn. "I did have an entry," he barked, "but you loused it up. Just pitch your king of diamonds on my third club lead

and now let's see Dale win nine tricks without letting me in." Mr. Champion was right. If Mr. Muzzy had played as suggested, Mr. Champion could have got the lead with his jack of diamonds before Mr. Dale could set up his fourth diamond. And that fourth diamond was Mr. Dale's only chance for nine tricks.

## Britain Sees Flying Buses in Helicopters

GLASGOW—Lord Douglas of Kirtleside, chairman of British European Airways, says that helicopters will soon be "popping in and out" around the western isles of Scotland. In fact, he said, Scots will operate what amounts to a flying bus service. "Soon," however, means 1958. Helicopters are still in early stages of development. "You cannot make a helicopter with fewer than 35 seats pay," said Lord Douglas. Until these are forthcoming, the chairman said, it will be unprofitable to use that type of machine commercially.

But the helicopter era is definitely on its way, he added.

Earlier, Lord Douglas talked about the experiment of using the south bank of the Thames as a possible helicopter base—with a view to cutting time of travelling to airports outside London and to nearby cities. Several trial landings were made in central London and the result provoked considerable optimism.

Britain, with its closely packed cities and towns, has a great incentive to be first in the rotor-plane business, said Lord Douglas, and while the aircraft are being improved, there is no reason why sites for ports need not be selected and prepared.
