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

The present transcontinental system is made up of two roads, the National Transcontinental, including the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern. If the New York Central Railway, for instance, were to purchase the old Grand Trunk Pacific, which, apparently the Canadian National does not want, it would give the American line an outlet on the Pacific without interfering with the business of the Canadian National. They could still continue their Vancouver business over the old Canadian Northern line. This would relieve them of a burden and would be a great acquisition to any live railroad taking it over.

Road A Liability Not An Asset.

The railroads today are a liability to the country and a heavy one. They are not an asset. If they were sold, the country would be relieved of a heavy burden and there would be more opportunity for development.

It would look like a mistake to break up the system in the east by lopping off some of the roads, but in the west this could be done quite easily.
