COMMISSIONER WILL ENFORCE LIQUOR LAW

Asks Hotelmen for Assistance but Declares Will go the Limit

The Victoria Times says: Mr. Hugh Davidson, British Columbia's Liquor Commissioner, told the members of the B.C. Hotels Association at their banquet in his honor that he intended to enforce the Liquor Law of this Province to the letter. He said he was "built that way" and reminded them likewise that those who observe the law will have nothing to fear; "but as for the others, that is another matter." In particular regard to the beer-by-the-glass business Mr. Davidson asked the hotelmen for their assistance and co-operation and promised them in return a fair and fearless administration.

No Politics
This is the first time Mr. Davidson has met the hotelmen of the Province in a body and it augurs well for the future success of his important task that a frank discussion of his own and the hotelmen's difficulties should have produced a harmonious understanding and general desire to see that the law is respected in every particular. The Commissioner did not beat about the bush when he warned his audience in plain language that neither political affiliation nor social connections would save any licensee from the consequences of violating the beer regulations.

AIRPLANE FELL INTO OCEAN BUT NOBODY SEEMED TO BE ALARMED

LONDON, Mar. 12.—Certain residents of the south coast of England were much astonished recently when an air force flying machine fell into the ocean and the authorities showed no undue anxiety about the fate of the pilot who, it was assumed, was aboard. After a while the air force men calmly put out in a skiff and towed the fallen plane to shore. The secret then leaked out the the machine had been without a pilot and that the accident was brought about by the plane passing beyond the radius of the wireless controlling force.

It was then learned for the first time that the planes seen for many weeks past circling in the air over this territory had all been without pilots; the control was by radio from a shore station.

A new library building at Washington is to have the figures of the world's eighteen greatest men on its facade. A list has been made up by the University of Washington, as follows:

- 1—Adam Smith, social science.
- 2—Beethoven, music.
- 3—Dante, poetry.
- 4—Darwin, biological science.
- 5—Leonarda de Vinci, art.
- 6—Benjamin Franklin, public service.
- 7—Galileo, physical science.
- 8—Goethe, poetry.
- 9—Grotius, international law.
- 10—Gutenberg, printing.
- 11—Herodotus, history.
- 12—Homer, poetry.
- 13—Justinian, law and administration.
- 14—Moses, religion.
- 15—Newton, mathematics and physics.
- 16—Pasteur, medical science.
- 17—Plato, philosophy.
- 18—Shakespeare, drama.

The list is interesting from its national aspect. There are three Englishmen, Darwin, Newton and Shakespeare. Scotland would claim one, Adam Smith, and the United States one, Benjamin Franklin, a New Englander of English stock. There are three of the ancient Greeks: Homer, Herodotus and Plato, while Leonarda de Vinci, Galileo and Dante were Italians and Justinian would be classed as a Roman. There are three Germans in the list, Beethoven, Goethe and Gutenberg. Grotius was a Dutchman and Pasteur a Frenchman. Moses came of the venerable Hebrew race.

MOVING MOUNTAIN IS MENACE TO PEOPLE IN RHYMNEY VALLEY

BARGOED, South Wales, Mar. 12.—The natives of Bargoed began a series of prayer services recently with the hope of bringing about the advent of dryer weather which it was believed would arrest the movements of Troedrihwfuch mountain near here which has done great property damage and become a menace to the community.

Fresh fissures have appeared at the foot of the moving mountain and all the nearby highways have been closed to traffic. Water mains supplying more than 100,000 persons in the Rhymney valley have been broken by the pressure of the moving earth and several hundred workmen have been employed to make repairs as rapidly as possible.

Several sections of a newly constructed main trunk sewer which cost more than \$3,000,000 have already been destroyed and in some places the pipes were pushed 20 to 30 feet out of position.

Cairo, Egypt, Mar. 11.—Egyptians who can read and write do not number in excess of 1,000,000 out of a population of 14,000,000, according to an estimate made by the Egyptian Gazette based on the census of several years ago. SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.
Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.
GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
