

### INTEREST RATE SETTLED UPON

City Council at Special Meeting Decides to Pay 5 1/2 per cent on Debenture Issue

A recommendation from the finance committee that 5 1/2 per cent instead of six per cent interest be paid on a \$90,000 issue of local improvement debentures that is about to be floated was adopted at a special meeting of the city council last evening. The recommendation was supported by a report from the city treasurer advising the change to 5 1/2 per cent interest on the ground that financial houses preferred to handle bonds bearing such interest, that the inspector of municipalities recommended it, that bonds bearing 5 1/2 per cent interest and discounted to 97 marketed more readily than 6 per cent bonds sold at 98 1/2 and that it would mean a saving of something like \$1,000 for the city on the 5 1/2 per cent basis. There was also a telegram from the inspector of municipalities reiterating his opinion that 5 1/2 per cent interest was preferable at this time to six per cent.

### MCLEOD VS. CITY CASE IS SETTLED

Action Will Not Go to Court—Council Accepts Suggestion Made by City Solicitor

The city council yesterday afternoon, on motion of Ald. McLeod, seconded by Ald. McKechnie, decided to accept a proposal whereby the case of M. H. McLeod vs. the City of Prince Rupert will be settled out of court. City Solicitor E. F. Jones advised the council that L. W. Patmore, counsel for Mr. McLeod, was willing to abandon the case provided there were no costs. Mr. Jones advised that the case be so disposed of and the council acted on the advice. Mr. McLeod was suing the city for \$2,850.00 for a balance claimed by him under a plank road repair contract.

### NOVEL BASED ON LIFE OF LORD BYRON

Interesting Insight Into Career of Famous Poet Given by Mrs. Adams Beck

Glorious Apollo, the new book by E. Barrington, is a fictional story of the life of Lord Byron. In some respects it is a horrible story in that it traces the gradual downfall of the great poet. In that respect it resembles the famous boy's story, "Eric or Little by Little."

The foibles and fancies of the poet are described in some detail and yet with a touch that eliminates much of their grossness. It gives the inspiration for his various poems and all woven together makes a novel that is intensely interesting even if at times slightly disgusting.

There is nothing in the book that appeals to the sensuous but rather it makes the reader condemn the grossness and sympathize with the virtuous wife, and even with the victims of the man.

### Fascinating Period

E. Barrington, whose real name is Mrs. Adams Beck of Victoria, B.C., has a brilliant touch. She is a student of history of the Elizabethan and later periods and she often lectures on subjects dealing with the fascinating periods. She studied all the historical evidence in regard to the life of Byron and the story, while fiction, is based as far as possible on documentary evidence, and the pictures of the life and times are intensely interesting.

In telling of the life of the young Byron after he has gone in for a period of physical culture, the author has the hero say that he was formerly sluggish, his brain was as thick as his body, he couldn't write. As a result of his training he was able to think and think brilliantly. It also improved his physical appearance so that he is described as beautiful. "So beautiful a countenance I never saw—his eyes are the open portals of the sun, things of light for light," says Sir Walter Scott, in writing of him.

### Beautiful Man

Perfection, Dallas thought. The close-curl'd auburn hair, the hazel grey eyes, clear as water in the gloom of black lashes, the firm and beautiful curves of the sensuous mouth, the full under-lip pressed strongly against the bow of the upper, the clean and noble line of the jaw from ear to chin, chiselled as by hand of a mighty sculptor and curving into the perfect cleft and the strong uplifted chin. Yes, perfection. And to crown all, the strangely beautiful pallor of the skin, as though lit from within by some suffused light, illuminating the face by the spirit, stary against a cloud. The wand of the enchanter had touched him, or rather he himself had become the enchanter.

### Opinion of Women

Byron is known best because of his relations with women. He was a rake, for at any rate he became one as he grew older. In a number of places he gives his opinion of women. He said there is a "deep-sunk instinct in the female breast that teaches her to long for conquest, not only over the man but also over all the other women who have desired him."

And again he speaks of "something inexplicable, handed down from savage ancestors, 'who knew women to be lower creatures and yet in alliance with dark powers.'"

In his journal he wrote, "The more I see of men, the less I like them. If I could but say the same of women, all would be well. Why can't I?" and again he wrote:

"The whole of the present system with regard to the female sex is a remnant of barbarism, of the chivalry of our forefathers. They ought to mind home, to be well fed and clothed, but not to mix in society. Well educated too in religion but to read neither poetry nor politics. They should indulge in music, drawing, dancing, also a little gardening and ploughing now and then."

### Choice of Wife

After a long season of dissipation Byron felt he ought to marry. When it was suggested to him by an elderly lady friend he answered:

"Certainly, I used not to think so, but now I feel that all men who can should marry. One might respect a wife; with other women it is impossible. His moral code is shown clearly when he is asked by the same person, "Does the scheme include fidelity to this paragon?" and he replied: "I should hope for that consummation, and if like all human hopes, it fell a little short of fulfillment, I think no woman of the world would condemn me utterly."

When argued with as to his conduct with women he agreed, and says he realizes he has two selves, one contemplative and calm as a Greek sage and the other when he plays his part in the drama of life perfectly, heedless of the consequences, though he knew the wickedness and madness of it all. "Some irresistible power drives me like a leaf before the wind. Is it madness? What is it?"

The book is well worthy of perusal. For those who look for a novel built on the orthodox plan, it will not appeal. To those who are looking for sex thrills will be disappointed. Those who are students and who are interested in the poetry of Byron should not fail to read "Glorious Apollo."
