### PRESENTATION MADE

Principles of Organized Labor  
Discussed by T. J. Shenton, Mine Inspector

The third annual banquet of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council was held in the St. Regis Cafe on Saturday evening. The attendance was large and much enthusiasm was displayed. There was an excellent program of music and addresses. The gathering was presided over by President S. D. Macdonald, who, in a brief opening address, said the banquet was primarily for the purpose of bringing the workers together. He outlined the accomplishments of the local council during the year.

Mayor Newton read a humorous poem, concluding with a fitting reference to the principles of organized labor.

**EDMONTON, Dec. 14.—** Some

pedestrians seem to think that they have a superior right to vehicles on any part of the highway. They certainly have on the portion especially set aside for them, but they as certainly have not on the portion especially provided for vehicular traffic though for the purpose of properly crossing such portion they have an equal right with that of vehicles."

In these words Chief Justice Harvie of the appellate division determines the rights of a pedestrian on a highway. He has handed down written judgment in the appeal of Turpie vs. Oliver, allowing the appeal of Arthur Oliver, the driver of an automobile against an award to Jas. and Mrs. Turpie for injuries sustained by the latter on being knocked down by Oliver's automobile. Mr. Justice Hyndman, in the chief justice's judgment and Mr. Justice Beck agreed with the result. On the other hand Mr. Justices Stuart and Clarke would have dismissed the appeal.
