FEEDING FOXES WITH WHALES

Nine Have Been Killed in Western Alaska and Sold to Farmers

Nine whales have been killed thus far by the crew of the whaleboat Gunnar, Captain Louis Lane, Richard Holbrook and Axel Hansen, all partners in the new fox feed enterprise which has been carried on this season in a manner quite pleasing to the owners, says the Seward Gateway. Indications point that the enterprise will be a success financially and according to the owners, who arrived in Seward recently from Kodiak where they have been hunting for the past two months, they will return from the south next season and operate in the same vicinity.

Located at Kodiak

The Gunnar, said to be the smallest independent unit whaler in the world, first arrived in Seward from Seattle the fore part of July, leaving Seward shortly for Kodiak which point has been used as the craft's base during whaling operations. The idea of hunting whales for fox feed was conceived by Captain Louis Lane, who is one of the Territory's leading authorities on fur. Whale meat is considered the natural food for the fox and due to its low cost, which is lower than any other form of feed, it is confidently believed a good business will eventually be realized by the pioneers and originators of the industry.

The nine whales killed to date were killed without any particular incident of importance in the way of excitement. Good weather was marked at all times.

Stored in Tanks

Fox ranchers who have tanks use them for storage of the meat but others, to whom whale meat has been delivered and having no tanks or barrels, buried the meat in order to preserve it.

In delivering a whale to the White & Walker fox farm on Goose island, the whale went aground during the night and the next morning the owners discovered six foxes gorging themselves.

In feeding blubber to fox pens it has been noticed that after eating it the fox would come close to the feeder and lick his hand in order to get every particle of oil off.

FLYING BOAT OF THE FUTURE

Expert Tells What he Thinks it Will be Like in Few Years

SOUTHAMPTON, Oct. 1.—At a sectional meeting of the British Association here O. E. Simmonds, M.A., drew an interesting picture of the flying boat of the future. Operationally a flying boat, he said, may be treated precisely as a ship; it may be left on the water for several weeks, and, if desirable, the crews can live on board. Multi-engine boats can be manoeuvred with great ease on the water, and large boats may be operated by experienced pilots, even in congested waterways, without external assistance. He would certainly feel that progress had been inordinately slow if they had not constructed a boat of 100,000 lb. gross weight by the end of the next decade. Supposing this was to be for commercial purposes, the machine would probably have an all-steel monoplane body of some 6,000 square feet wing area and 220 feet span. The power units would be housed in engine rooms built into the thick wing some 30 feet out from the hull, and the output from each room at full revolutions would be some 3,000 brake horse power.

Once the boat was in the air they could fly comfortably on 60 per cent of full power, and the fear of a forced landing might therefore be dismissed. The hull would be arranged in two decks and provide spacious accommodation for 100 passengers. The speed would exceed 100 knots, and the boat would undertake flights up to 4,500 miles without alighting. By slightly reducing the number of passengers, therefore, such a boat could fly from Europe to America with only one stop, at the Azores, and accomplish the whole flight within 36 hours. Mr. Simmonds predicted that in the future the flying boat will prove herself a most speedy, efficient, and desirable means of transport for commerce and pleasure, a serious competitor with the liner and the airship for the world's ocean traffic.

AUSTRALIAN ELECTION ON

Contest Between Nationalist and Labor Groups Over Treatment of Communists

MELBOURNE, Australia, Oct. 1.—(By Canadian Press.)—The Australian general election which will be on November 13 will be watched with considerable interest in other parts of the British Empire as well as in the island continent in view of the fight between the Bruce Nationalist government and the Labor Party as the result of the unofficial strike of British seamen in Australian waters. Indeed the election has been precipitated by the strike and the appeal of the Premier, Stanley Melbourne Bruce, to the country is in the nature of a challenge to the extremists of the Labor Party.

The recent passage in the Australian House of Representatives of the amendment to the Immigration Act providing for the deportation of any person who is not of Australian birth, who has been found guilty of fomenting labor troubles precipitated a crisis. The bill had a stormy route through the House because of the opposition of the Labor Party, led by Matthew Charlton, member for Hunter, New South Wales. Incidentally there was a wholesale issuance of warrants for the arrest of 600 striking British seamen. All this aroused such strong criticism of the government that Premier Bruce decided on the dissolution of the House and an appeal to the country.

Aimed at Seamen's Union

The bill providing for deportation and the appointment of a deportation board to carry out the measure is generally regarded as having been aimed chiefly at Tom Walsh, president of the Australian Seamen's Union, known as an extremist in the Labor Party. Walsh and J. Johannsen, another labor agitator, have been asked to show cause why they should not be deported for their activity in the seamen's strike. Labor Leader Charlton and his supporters in the House of Representatives, in opposing the bill, declare that this was an infringement on the liberty of the subject.

The outcome of the election may have a far-reaching effect, and the result may depend to a large extent on whether or not the seamen's strike is settled in the meantime.

Against Communists

Premier Bruce classes President Tom Walsh of the Australian Seamen's Union as a Communist. A short time prior to the Premier's announcement that he would dissolve parliament and appeal to the people for a mandate he made a speech in which he attacked the Communists. He declared that they had gained control of trades unionism in Australia and were using it to aid in bringing about a social revolution and the establishment of a dictatorship by them over the whole of the Commonwealth. The Premier said the Government was determined to fight Communism with all the means at its disposal, and the government would not permit any section of the community to arrogate to itself the power to enforce its will on the people against their consent. He demanded a mandate to enact measures "necessary to maintain the supremacy of parliamentary government and law and order."

Matthew Charlton, the Labor leader, in an address replying to a former speech of Premier Bruce denouncing Bolshevism in which speech the Premier, referring to the seamen's strike, said "the viper of Communism has raised its head," declared that the press and many public men were endeavoring to overshadow "the real issue" by trying to

scare the people into believing that Australia was on the brink of a social revolution.

Criticizes Government

Mr. Charlton, criticizing the government for having passed the deportation bill, referred to the fact that the British seamen's strike had occurred in Great Britain, New Zealand and South Africa, as well as in Australia, and said that no such drastic legislations as this had been passed by any of these other countries. He said he thought the ordinary penalty for law breaking should serve within the Commonwealth, without resort to special measures.

The Bruce government succeeded the administration of William Morris Hughes, K.C., after the last general election, and the Bruce cabinet was formed on February 9, 1925, with S. M. Bruce as Premier and Minister for External Affairs. Hughes was Premier of Australia from October 27, 1915, until his government was overthrown in the general election and Bruce succeeded him on February 9, 1923, as stated.

CALF OF BISON IS BORN IN LONDON ZOO

European Variety in Danger of Total Extinction but American Doing Well

A fine bison calf has been born at the Zoo and gives every prospect of doing well. The American bison is no longer in danger of extinction that threatened it a quarter of a century ago. Although the wild herds in the United States had almost been wiped out, there was a sufficient remnant able to recover under the strict protection given it. At the same time the blood was reinforced by sending to the reserves some of the finer young bulls bred in zoological gardens.

Now both in the National Park at Yellowstone and in the still larger reserves of Canada, the species is multiplying. On the other hand, the European bison is in greater danger than ever befell the American species. There are very few examples in captivity, and the species is less hardy or does not breed so well in restraint. The wild herds are believed to be extinct or reduced to a few scattered individuals.

The European Bison Society, an international association with headquarters at Frankfurt, has instituted a stock-book and is collecting information as to all the individuals in captivity with a view to securing exchanges and in giving the greatest possible opportunity for breeding.
