Canadian Covernment Merchant Marine Shows Operating Profit First Ten Months of this Year

Business of Service is Improving With Result That Operating Deficit is Changed to Small Surplus.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 10 .- Improvement of \$667,124 in the perations of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine for the first ten months of 1925 as compared with the corresponding period of 1924 is reported by R. B. Teakle, general manager of the company, there being an operating profit of \$12,541 at the end of the first ten months of 1925 as compared with an operating deficit of \$289,879 over the same period last year.

Taking into account the overhaul, general and wharf expenses there is a saving of another \$64,704 which brings the total improvement in the operat-
