ANYOX MINE CLUB ACTIVE

Organization Was Started Two Years Ago and Has Been Very Successful

Two years ago, in the month of December, the Mine Hall was opened under the most favorable of auspices, a jolly dance celebrating the occasion, with a large number from the Beach attending, says the Granby News.

The section of the community on the hill had long desired a gathering place where social functions of a worthwhile standard could be staged, especially during the months of winter, when it was not always possible to attend affairs at the Beach owing to the roads being impassable on account of heavy snowfalls. When at length it had been decided to go ahead with the construction of a building, there were many uses to be considered, and when the final arrangements were approved the plans showed an auditorium which could be utilized for general gymnasium purposes, a picture show, dances and any other style of entertainment which the energetic community committee might consider staging for the benefit of that section of the camp.

Since that evening two years ago, which was really the birth date of the Mine Club, a number of diversified programs have been offered for the amusement of Anyox folk; and because they have been of a high order in every instance, liberal patronage has been the rule, and success in a financial way has resulted.

Does Good Service

The Mine Hall is the centre of Mine Club activities, which organization has grown into the life of the community on the hill, and gives promise of continuing its service for a considerable time to come. It will undoubtedly do so, especially if it gets the support it is rightfully entitled to, for its work has been good. The activities of the Mine Club cover a wide range, including social evenings, where cards, concerts and dances comprise the features, as well as the financing of baseball and football teams during summer months and of several basketball units throughout the winter in the schedules of the Anyox Basketball Association.

LASH FOR YOUTHS IN WINNIPEG CASE

Held up Citizens but Got Little Money; Now Serving Time in Penitentiary

WINNIPEG, Dec. 10.—Twenty lashes and five years in the penitentiary was the sentence imposed on Harry Pearson and Max Brandley by Sir Hugh Macdonald in police court. The two youths were members of a gang of hold-up artists who operated in Winnipeg for some time.

Three companions, Chas. G. Howard, John Blain and Edward Eckies were each sentenced to four years in the penitentiary.

Pearson was convicted on two charges of robbery. Together with Eckies, Howard and Blain he held up W. H. Woods on Elgin Avenue, forcing the latter at gun point to hand over all the money he had on him, which happened to be only \$2. He also pleaded guilty to holding up Theodor Skymrie on Logan Avenue a few days after the Woods affair and getting away with a cheque for \$50. A second man was with Pearson in the Skymrie hold-up, but his identity has not been disclosed.

Blain likewise had two charges against him. One for his part in the Woods affair, the other for assisting Brandley in the holding up of Thomas Southern on Notre Dame and Princess. Little came of the Southern hold-up, the bandits being frightened off by the approach of a pedestrian after they had ordered their victim to throw his hands up.

GREENLAND ESKIMOS WELL ADVANCED IN CIVILIZATION ARTS

The Eskimos of Greenland are five hundred years ahead of other Eskimos, Captain J. E. Bernier, veteran commander of the steamship Arctic, told a gathering of radio men at a luncheon recently given by the Montreal and District Radio Club. Captain Bernier is said to be the oldest sea captain in the world still on duty, for he will be seventy-four next January. He has been in command of no less than 107 ships, has circled the world twenty-seven times and has anchored in every important port.

Speaking of the advanced stage of the Eskimos of Greenland he said that they have their own Parliament. The Eskimos under Canadian rule are far from that stage, and it will be a long time before they are educated enough to make their own laws. Last year Captain Bernier visited Greenland, and also this year. On the latter visit the Eskimos were delighted to see the motion pictures of themselves which had been taken the year before. They have been taught how to dress respectably and they have their own newspapers.
