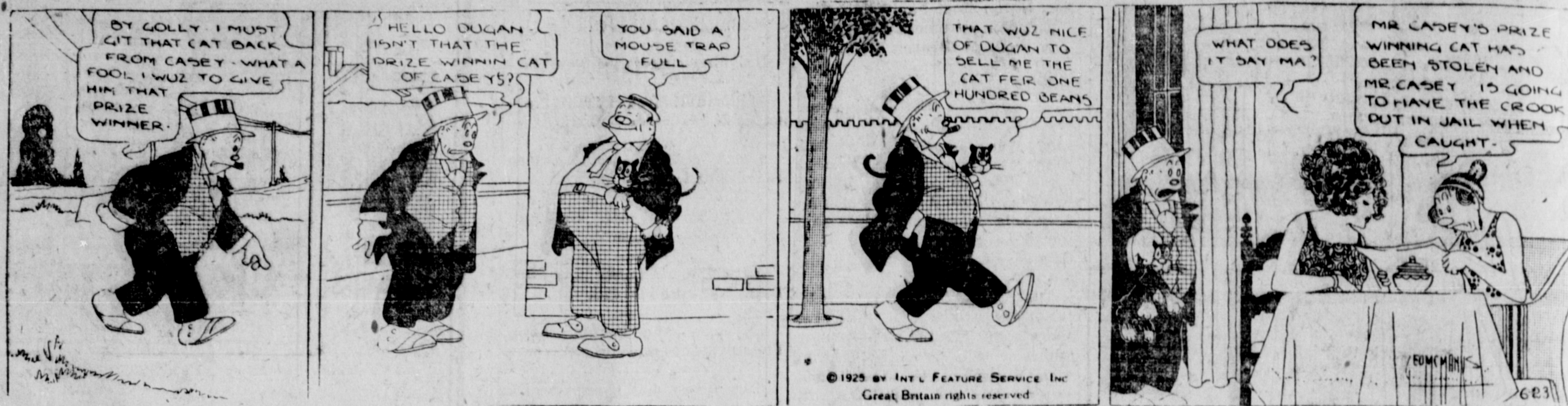

DAMAGE DONE BY BLASTING

Windows Broken in Stores and Houses Around Sixth Avenue and Fulton Street

Yesterday afternoon the residents in the vicinity of Sixth Avenue and Fulton Street were startled by what seemed a rather heavy blast in the rock cut which the city is putting through. After the dust and powder had cleared away it was found that there had been some damage done to property although no one received as much as a scratch.

It seems that considerable powder had been used in this blast in an endeavor to break loose some large portion of the rock, but the powder, instead of doing all the work which was expected of it partly blew out through some of the seams of the rocks thus causing the damage to the surrounding buildings.

One rock was carried to a house occupied by Mrs. Richard Long. It burrowed through the roof and dropped through the ceiling to the floor of the bedroom. Two or more stragglers chose the Hart Apartments as their target and passed through the roof without doing any very great damage. Another passed through the window in the front of the Levin Apartments and demolished a piano stool. Several smaller ones found their way as far as the Heilbronner Block at the corner of Sixth and Fulton and broke several panes of glass as well as the plate in the front of Linzey & Davies' store. Possibly the greatest loss will be from glass breakages, from which practically all the buildings in the vicinity suffered more or less. It will probably be a few days before the actual loss will be known. In the meantime, the city is busy repairing the damage and work is proceeding as usual at the rock cut.

BUSY AFTERNOON ALONG WATERFRONT

Many Tourists Were Here on Boats and Trains Yesterday

Yesterday afternoon was rather busy on the waterfront. At 3:15 the Prince Charles arrived from Stewart with a good passenger list. Fifteen minutes later the train pulled in with a good number of tourists. At four o'clock the Prince George sailed for Alaska with a full passenger list, and about the same time the Princess Louise arrived from the north with a heavy passenger list. To complete the afternoon the Prince Charles sailed at 6 o'clock for the south with all passenger accommodation taken.

ADVERTISING LIQUOR AT BORDER TABOO

Liquor Commissioner Takes Action Regarding Distribution of Cards

VICTORIA, July 16. — It has just come to the attention of the liquor commissioner that cards are being distributed at the international border to American motorists advertising four particular brands of liquor and giving the addresses of the liquor vendors' stores where these can be had. While the cards have the usual note at the bottom that this advertising is not done by the B.C. Government or the Liquor Control Board there is a false impression created that the government is adopting this means to increase liquor sale to American tourists. The commissioner has given instructions to vendors between Vancouver and the boundary line to remove from their shelves the brands mentioned on the cards until further notice.
