CHAMPION GROWER OF HEAVY CROPS

Horace Johnson has Farmed Twenty Years with Average 28 Bushels to Acre

CHAMPION, Alta., Dec. 29.—

(By Canadian Press)—Western Canada's agricultural history abounds with records of enormous wheat yields per acre, but this district advances the name of Horace Johnson, an old timer of the Champion community, for the title of the most consistent producer of good crops.

For more than twenty years Mr. Johnson has farmed in this district and according to figures he has kept, has averaged a yield of about twenty-eight bushels to the acre during the entire period. Mr. Johnson has never experienced a crop failure although he has suffered losses similar to other farmers from natural causes.

WONDERFUL AIR STUNT.

Airplane Takes off and Lands on Dirigible

LONDON, Dec. 29.—The airship R33 made a short flight from Pulham, leaving the hangar at 12:35 p.m. She was seen over Norwich and returned to Pulham shortly after 3 o'clock. An aeroplane was detached at a height of about 2,000 feet and was successfully rehooked about five minutes afterwards.

The Air Ministry stated that the unhooking and rehooking tests were both carried out successfully without a hitch. After climbing several thousand feet R33 flew steadily along, and the pilot then descended from the airship to his seat in the cockpit of the aeroplane. The trapeze to which the aeroplane is fixed was fully unwound and the machine was swinging in the air about fifty feet below the airship. Squadron Leader Haig then pulled the release levers, dived his machine, then freed from the trapeze, until he picked up his engine. Returning to the neighborhood of the airship the airman adjusted as far as possible his speed to that of the airship. When this was accomplished the aeroplane pilot, who was flying at about the same level as that of the lowered trapeze, pointed the nose of his machine directly at the bar of the trapeze. His hooking-on guide, which is carried on the top of the aeroplane, made contact with the bar at once and, after the swinging of the machine had somewhat subsided, the trapeze was slowly wound in, bringing the aeroplane to its normal position.

AROUND VANCOUVER ISLAND TRIPS IS PLAN OF C.P.R.

VICTORIA, Dec. 28.—According to announcement made here by the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. cruises around Vancouver Island up the west coast and down the east will be instituted next year as a tourist attraction. The Princess Mary will be the vessel used and the voyages will be of eight days' duration.

HOTEL MAN DEAD.

NELSON, B.C., Dec. 28.—John "Swede" Nelson, aged sixty, trustee of the Kootenay Hotel and a resident of that hotel for thirty years, dropped dead in the hotel. He was a patient in hospital three weeks, but left the institution at noon on the day of his death.
