# MIXED FARMING NOW GENERAL ON PRAIRIES

No More "Wheat Mining" Going on There For All Have Gardens

WINNIPEG, Aug. 21.—Straight grain farming or wheat mining as it is called in western Canada is gradually but surely becoming a thing of the past on the three prairie provinces. No longer is it possible to find the traditional mound of tin cans in the back yard of each farm home for the time when such a state of affairs signified that the farmer was dependent upon the returns from his wheat crop for his daily food is nearly gone.

Almost every farmer in Western Canada today has at least a few pigs, cows or poultry and some sort of a vegetable garden from which he secures food not only for himself and family but also sufficient returns to look after his current expenses on a cash basis. Manitoba and Alberta undoubtedly lead in this development but even Saskatchewan, the great wheat mining province of the west, has an ever-increasing number of farmers who are followers of the mixed farming plan to the extent that they are living upon the products of their farms.

# LARGEST GRAIN CROP IN BULKLEY VALLEY REPORTED BY VISITOR

Splendid crop conditions in the Bulkley Valley are reported by Jack McNeil of Telkwa who is in the city on business. The hay crop, while not unusually large, has been of excellent quality and was matured rapidly as a result of the warm weather early in the season. About the largest grain crop he has ever seen in the Bulkley Valley is now being cut says Mr. McNeil. Vegetable and field crops are in splendid shape.

# CRUEL DEATH OF LAD MOCASSIN DESCRIBED IN COURT THIS MORNING.

(continued from page one)

King, E. Davidson, W. H. Derry, K. A. Rood, W. Longwill, J. J. Gillis, G. A. Kelsey and Howard Steen. The jurymen who acted in the case of Big Alec yesterday were stood aside as well as the following: J. Naylor, J. W. Ax-ley, J. Hunter, S. Wood and W. H. Montgomery. Mrs. Emily Morris was challenged by the defence.

After L. W. Patmore, counsel for the crown, had outlined his case to the jury, Lucy Lool was called to the stand. She had been brought to the Thirty Mile bar encampment by her brother Glem on account of her father's illness. Her father died soon after her arrival and subsequently Edie took her to the place where Moccasin was tied. Edie had said "Father dead. Now let Moccasin go dead, too. I don't care." She said that Big Alec had induced her to tie Moccasin up. When Lucy told Edie that she would get in trouble when the white men found out she (Edie) said: "Nobody tell somebody." Moccasin had enquired from Lucy as to why he had been tied up.

A demonstration was then given in the court as to the manner in which Moccasin had been tied and was lying. He was on his side with his hands bound behind him, his feet also bound together with the knees under the chin. Edie had picked up a stick and was going to strike Moccasin on the head but Lucy took the stick away from her. Lucy took off the moose hide things with which Moccasin was bound and a fire was lit to warm him. He could not walk and his eyes were frozen so that he could not see. Later Moccasin died, his death being reported to Lucy by Edie.

Inspector Sandys-Wunsch told of the special trip that had been made into the district to investigate the murder. News of it had leaked out through Big Alec telling a Hudson Bay factor that Moccasin had been killed and he was afraid he in turn would be killed. Big Alec later denied this to the police officers, saying that Moccasin had died from pneumonia.

# Edie's Confession

Particulars as to the finding of Moccasin's body and the arrest and preliminary trial at Liard Post by Inspector Wunsch were then given. After being
