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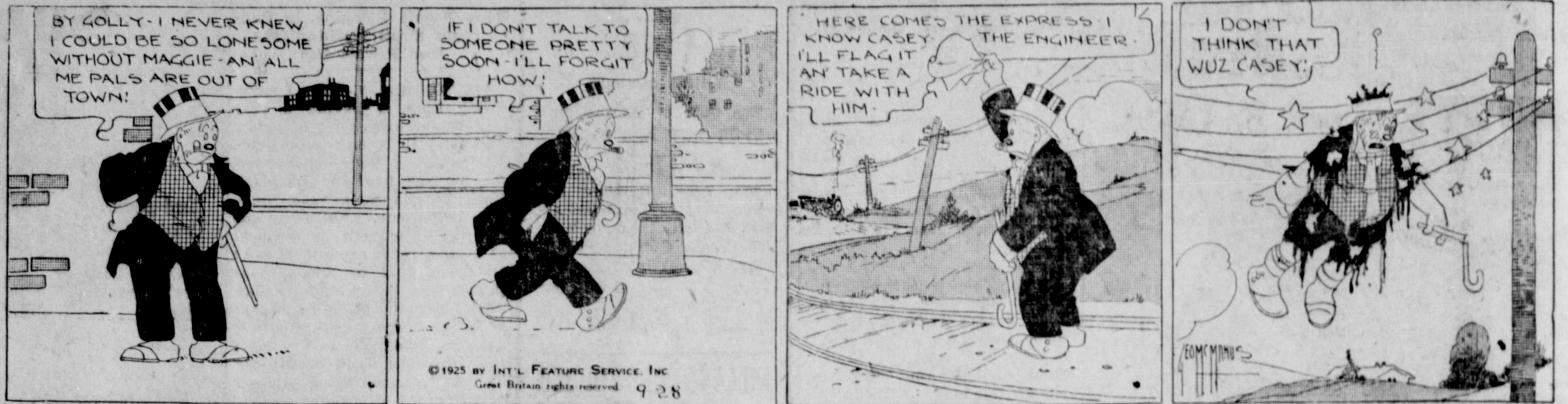

### FIGHT OVER WORLD COURT

Final Action Likely to be Taken in Coming Session of Senate

WASHINGTON, October 6. — Friends of the World Court are sending out a call to supporters of that proposition to rally for the fight which they perceive is coming when the Senate, December 17, takes up the court resolution and debates it with a view to final action upon it.

Under the Senate agreement, the resolution is simply to be taken up December 17, but it is generally conceded that it will not be sidetracked until there is a final vote.

Although the leaders of the World Court movement in the Senate are claiming more than enough votes to pass the resolution, some of the advocates of the court outside the Senate are not sure about it. They say the fight is not yet over. They fear that through reservations and amendments, the support for the resolution yet may be beaten. Senators Borah, Reed of Missouri, Moses, Pepper and several others will lead the fight against the World Court resolution. They will seek to obtain amendments to divorce the court from the League of Nations or reservations calculated to keep the United States as far aloof from the League of Nations as possible.

### GERMAN MENNONITES LEAVING FOR MEXICO

Russians Are Taking Their Places on the Manitoba Farms

WINNIPEG, Oct. 6. — The last batch of the German Mennonite colony which is migrating from Western Canada to Mexico, will be transferred to their new homes so soon as their holdings on the prairies are disposed of, according to F. F. D. Wiebe, of Herbert, Sask., who is directing the "trek" from the Canadian end.

"Since we obtained the concessions in 1924, comprising 300,000 acres of land in Mexico, more than 6,000 German Mennonites, who are conscientious objectors, have settled in Mexico. They have received a fairly good crop this year and their stock operations have been successful," Mr. Wiebe declared.

The Mexican government, he added, has honored its side of the bargain and lived up to the terms of the concession. The newcomers were permitted to have their own schools and churches where the German language was spoken exclusively. The settlers were also permitted to manage their own internal affairs and are exempt from military service.

In Mr. Wiebe's opinion, the exodus from Canada, hardly represents a loss in population. Incoming Russian Mennonites he pointed out, were taking over the land.

### AUTO IMPORTS MOUNT.

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 7. — The number of automobiles in Sweden, government statistics show, increased from 8,596, or one for each 705 inhabitants in 1919, to 62,820 or one for each 95 inhabitants at the end of 1924. The cars are mostly American made.

The government's income from motor business last year included \$1,423,314 taxes on automobiles; \$774,043 on tires and \$1,347,046 on gasoline.

### KOREAS NOW DWELL IN CAVES TO NUMBER OF THREE THOUSAND

TOKYO, Oct. 7. — Reports from Seoul, Korea, state that more than 3,000 residents of that place are dwelling in caves, just as their ancestors did in a primitive age. It is believed that most of these cave dwellers are members of the poverty stricken, unemployed class which has been greatly augmented lately because of the industrial depression.

The Seoul authorities are declared to be somewhat perturbed over the situation and are planning relief measures in order to halt the cave digging tendencies of the inhabitants.
